CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., March 26.—The democratic state convention, for the purpose of selecting delegates to the national convention, met today. Bryan men are in the majority.

CROWD APPLAUDS CANDIDATE CAKE

Statement No. 1 Finds Many Adherents in Audience Addressed by Senatorial Candidate—Scandals of Legislative Elections and Deadlocks.

A fair-sized audience turned out Thursday evening to hear H. M. Cake talk on political issues of the day. Mr. Cake is a candidate for republican nomination as United States senator to succeed Charles W. Fulton, and is making his campaign flatterly upon Statement No. 1, which provides for the popular election of senators.

Mr. Cake was introduced by W. I. Vawter. He spoke at first upon national politics, advocating the policies enforced by President Roosevelt. Then he turned his attention to Statement No. 1 and fully discussed it from all viewpoints.

Mr. Cake read the history of senatorial elections for the past 20 years, gave details about the numerous deadlocks and the waste of public money and the scandals following almost every session in every state when a toga was the prize contested for.

The speaker went into details concerning the disgraceful scenes enacted at Salem, in the famous session when the legislature failed to organize, of the numerous deadlocks and the forty days and forty nights of wasted efforts on the part of the people's representatives. He went over briefly the popular struggle for the direct election of senators and announced his willingness to abide by the will of the people.

"If with 30,000 republican majority, a democrat is elected senator in Oregon, by the people, then there is something the matter with the republican party and its candidate. I do not fear this result. I am willing to abide by the expressed will of the people. If the people want a democratic senator, it is their right to send one, and their instructions should be observed."

Mr. Cake was frequently interrupted by applause. He left Friday morning for Ashland.

ORDINANCE NO. 147.

An ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 145, passed by the city council on March 17, 1908.

The City of Medford doth ordain as follows:
Section 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 145, entitled, "An Ordinance to prevent and prohibit female persons from entering, going or being in any saloon, barroom, tipping house or drinking place or other room, house or place where spirituous, malt, vinous or intoxicating liquors of any kind are sold within the corporate limits of the City of Medford, Oregon," approved March 17, 1908, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation engaged, either as owner or owners, proprietor or proprietors, agent or agents, employe or employes, in the running or carrying on of any saloon, barroom, tipping house or drinking place or other room or place of any kind or nature where spirituous, malt, vinous or other intoxicating liquors or beer, wine or ale are sold or kept for sale within the corporate limits of the city of Medford, Oregon, to permit or allow any female person at any time to enter, go, come or be within his or their place of business, or any room, house or place connected therewith and adjoining or adjacent thereto, where such intoxicants are sold or kept or delivered after sale, and it shall be unlawful for any female person to enter, go, come or be within any such place at any time. Provided, however, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to the public dining room of any hotel when used as a dining room."

Section 2. Inasmuch as the said Ordinance No. 145 is in some respects impracticable of enforcement in its present form, and should be corrected as in this ordinance provided, before it shall become effective, and it is necessary to the public safety that this amendment should become effective coincidentally with the said Ordinance No. 145, an emergency is found to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the mayor.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the council March 25, 1908, Trowbridge voting aye, Effert aye, Warrington aye, Merrick aye, Otwell absent, Hafer absent.
