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**FOR WATER SUPPLY.**

The city council special water committee has made its report declaring in favor of procuring a water supply for Medford from Wasco Canyon Springs. The report is tardily being presented owing to the delay in arriving at satisfactory terms with the present owners of water rights, who have agreed to put up an indemnifying bond protecting the city in case of litigation over the water rights. It is unfortunate that the report has been so long delayed, as such an important proposition as bonding the city for \$200,000 should be most fully discussed in all of its details. However, fullest confidence is reposed in the water committee, the members of which have devoted almost their entire time for the past two months in probing the question. The bond election occurs Friday, April 3, and to vote against the issue will be to delay indefinitely the program of municipal improvement absolutely necessary to keep Medford in the front rank of Southern Oregon cities.

It has been suggested that, in view of the great amount of cement sidewalk work to be done in Medford the coming season, that all contractors be compelled to submit samples of the cement used to the city engineer, to prevent the use of poor materials. It is a good suggestion.

Dr. Alexander Reid, a physician of Portland, is out after the scalp of J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner. Dr. Reid has a wide acquaintance throughout the state, and in entering the contest against the present incumbent will make a strong campaign for the republican nomination. It is to be hoped that Dr. Reid defeats Mr. Bailey, who richly deserves it.

**FILING TIMBER CLAIMS UPON MINERAL LANDS**

Cook & Howland, of the Hydraulic Mining company, who were in the city this week, report that there is a good deal of indignation—with a tinge of profanity to it—among the miners of Jump-Off-Joe district and Northern Josephine generally because of the operations of unscrupulous timber locators who have been filing timber claims on mineral lands. One of these would be claimants embraced in his quarter-section three claims of the Hydraulic Mining company's property along Jump-Off-Joe, and this in face of the fact that the corner monuments were perfectly plain and that furthermore there was a modern mining plant in continuous operation upon it.

Claims were taken up by these grafters on section 24, where mining operations have been going on for years; and as a crowning piece of nerve, the property of the old Hammersley mine in section 14, one of the best known mines in this section, was filed upon by these sharks.

Cook & Howland have consulted atorneys about the matter and they are informed that every one of these locators is open to prosecution on the charge of perjury. It is the plan of the mining men to bring the matter before the grand jury at the present term, and with this end in view photographs of mining plants and prominent corner monuments have been taken and will be forwarded to Portland. It is high time this sort of imposition was stopped and we hope there will be concerted action among the miners to bring the offenders to justice, save the Pacific Out look.

**USES HOT AIR TO HEAT AUTO FOR WINTER SPINS**

The use of hot air from the exhaust to heat a motor car for winter touring is the novel scheme of J. D. Turner, a Franklin owner of Grand Forks, N. D. Mr. Turner recently made a 700-mile trip in a Franklin roadster from Grand Forks to Quincy, Ill., in the midst of a real western blizzard, but with his new heating apparatus and a closed canvas top he and his companion went through snow storms and zero weather in comfort.

The method of heating consisted of placing on the floor of the car a coil of pipes connected directly with the "main exhaust." The "main exhaust" of the Franklin carries off only about 20 per cent of the burnt gases, and its temperature was just about right to heat the car comfortably. The remainder of the exploded gases in the Franklin passes out through the auxiliary exhaust, which opens at the lower end of the cylinder, just as the piston completes the power stroke.

On the trip from Grand Forks to Quincy, although the rough roads, deep snow and hills were considered very where, not even a spark plug was touched, nor was any adjustment made on the engine.

**Certificates Must Be in Force.**  
Attorney General Crawford has rendered an opinion in which he holds that a candidate for county school superintendent must be the holder of a valid teachers' certificate of the first grade county certificate of better. The law on this subject is plain and the only point to the opinion is that it is not sufficient that a man has held a first-grade county certificate. The certificate must be in force at the time he becomes a candidate.

**FIFTY MILLION BOND ISSUE TO COMPLETE OREGON LINES**

That the proposed \$50,000,000 bond issue of the Union Pacific will provide

for the completion of the Harriman projects now under way in this state is believed. That the issue of these bonds will mean the rapid completion of the lines in Oregon upon which work was suspended when the financial stringency arose last fall is the hope of the people of this state. Several important projects started by the Harriman lines are held up on account of the financial flurry. While work has been resumed on a number of the lines under construction last fall, when work was ordered stopped, several important projects are still held in abeyance. These dormant projects involve the expenditure of about \$7,000,000.

One of the most important lines upon which it is hoped construction will be resumed at an early date is that of the Oregon Western, the Southern Pacific extension from the main line at Drain to Marshfield, a distance of 81 miles. Some work has been done on this road, but much remains to be done, and it is estimated that two years would be required to complete it. The expense of building this line will be about \$3,500,000.
