AMENDMENT ABOLISHES COUNTY JUDGE'S OFFICE

A proposed constitutional amendment which has received very little public attention is that which provides for the election of five supreme judges, instead of three, as at present, and authorizes legislation which will confer probate powers upon circuit judges.

This amendment was submitted by the legislature, and had its origin in the fact that the supreme court has in recent years been behind in its work once or twice, and for a considerable time, through the employment of a number of stenographers enabled the court to catch up about two years ago. There has also been agitation for a number of years in favor of a change which would place the probate business in the hands of a judge who is a competent attorney.

BIG LAND BOOM TO FOLLOW NEW RAILROAD

DORRIS, Cal., April 2.—That Dorris will be the center of an immense land boom the coming summer is now a pretty well established fact. Already local real estate dealers are receiving numerous inquiries regarding the date of the arrival of the railroad and requesting facts relative to the Klumath irrigation and reclamation project.

The large holdings of the Churchills in this vicinity in all probability will be cut up into small farms of from 40 to 160 acres, and offered for sale. Besides the J. E. and Dorris ranches, the Churchills own nearly 20,000 acres (ultimately in Dorris, as well as the Boyce ranch of 2000 acres close to Mount Hebron.

With a good, live land company handling the Churchill lands at Dorris and other holdings near here being offered at reasonable prices, Dorris will be the Mecca for the homeseeker this summer. More crops have been put in this spring than ever before, and the present outlook is said by old residents to be ideal for an extraordinarily large yield.

It is perhaps a safe estimate to say that not one-tenth of the tillable land of Butte and adjacent valleys is today under cultivation, and yet the section is known far and wide as one of the best of farming districts. Now that the valley is to be settled, and thoroughly farmed, who can say what will be the limit of its development? Dorris as the natural center will soon take its place as one of the foremost towns in the northern part of the state.

LA FOLLETTE SENTIMENT

GROWING IN OREGON

PORTLAND, April 2.—The republican state central committee is summoned to meet in Portland, April 29, to call a state convention and to name the number of delegates that every county in the state may send to that convention.

The republican state convention will choose four delegates-at-large for the national convention; also four candidates for presidential electors. The state central committee also will provide for conventions in the two congressional districts, each district naming two delegates, which gives Oregon, altogether, a total of eight delegates in the national convention.

Without waiting for the call of the state central committee, several counties of Oregon already have held their conventions and elected delegations to attend the state convention.

The Marion county convention refused to pass a resolution instructing for Taft. So far no convention in Oregon has instructed for either Taft or Hughes. Many delegates are known to be in favor of the renomination of Roosevelt or of the nomination of La Follette; and the Oregon state convention is likely to instruct accordingly.

La Follette's recent speeches in the senate on the currency bill have multiplied his constituency over the entire country. He is a favorite in the west. Every republican in Oregon should attend his county convention and should see that the right kind of men are sent to the state convention. The responsibility rests upon every voter. Not much time remains to act and to organize.
