Why Mulkey is Sure of Election Republican Taxpayer Enumerates Reasons That Should Induce Everyone to Vote for Candidate for Prosecuting Attorney of Jackson County. Medford, Or., March 30. To the Editor: I favor the election of B. P. Mulkey to the office of district attorney for the first prosecuting attorney's district for the following reasons: 1. As president of the Southern Oregon State Normal school for six years he has shown unusual executive administrative ability, and there accomplished a good work for Southern Oregon with slight reference to financial gain to himself. 2. He has proved himself a faithful servant in public office. At the expiration of a term as clerk in Polk county his books were examined by experts employed by a democratic county court and were found accurate and correct in all particulars. 3. As a member of the Oregon state senate he was one of the foremost debaters and lawyers in that body. Ex-Chief Justice William P. Lord wrote a friend of this district recently: "If Mulkey handles the law of his cases as he discussed the legal questions on the floor of the Oregon senate he will be a strong prosecutor from the first." 4. He was head of the ways and means committee at the legislative sessions of 1898 and 1899, sessions noted in legislative history for the economy with which the public funds were managed. Mr. Mulkey did not originally seek the district attorneyship, but was called into it by the solicitation of a hundred or more republicans, and the office is seeking the man more than the man is seeking the office.
