NO LICENSE MEANS NO
COMMISSION IN SALEM.
SALEM, OR., April 3.—Judge Ber-
son, of department No. 1, of the circuit
court of this district has rendered a de-
cision that will drive out of existence
a whole swarm of rascals who real estate
dealers who have been doing business
without a license.

PROPERTY OF G. W. Drashear in the En-
gwood addition of this city for \$8000.
Judge Burnett, in his decision, states
that no person not holding a real estate
license from the city can compel the
payment of a commission.
Attorney M. E. Pogue, representing
Pogue, contended the city charter was
not broad enough to compel persons to
take out licenses. McNary & McNary,
representing the defense, secured a dis-
missal of the case with costs.

MONDAY LAST DAY
TO ESCAPE PENALTY
Next Monday will be the last day for
the payment of taxes without a penalty
for delinquency. One-half of the
amount due may be paid at this time,
and the county will obligingly carry
the remainder until October. But unless
half has been paid, 10 per cent penalty
will be added after Monday and 1 per
cent per month thereafter until the tax
is paid.

SHORTAGE OF FOOD STUFFS
ON CURRY COUNTY COAST.
GOLD BEACH, OR., April 3.—Since
the loss of R. D. Hens's schooner Ber-
wick at the mouth of the Siuslaw, peo-
ple are beginning already to feel the
shortage of commodities which have de-
pendent on the Berwick for importation.

SISSON FISH EGGS
SHIPPED TO GERMANY.
SISSON, CAL., April 3.—Superintend-
ent Shelby of the state fish hatchery,
located here, shipped three boxes of
fish eggs to a German society in Ger-
many Sunday evening. They will go
by express to New York, where they
will be taken in charge by someone who

will go with them to their far-away
destination. The greatest care was
taken in packing the eggs, and three
men were employed a week in getting
them ready for shipment. The express
charges to New York alone will be
more than \$100.

PRESIDENT IS PLANNING
CAMPAIGN ON ANARCHISTS.
WASHINGTON, April 3.—Bull and

a great impetus if the present program
of President Roosevelt goes through,
and there is little room for doubt that
it will. The president will send a mes-
sage to congress asking for anarchy
legislation.

MOHAIR MARKET PROMISES
A VERY POOR SEASON.
The mohair market is going from
bad to worse, and what at first looked
like merely a dull season now promises
to be a very poor one, says the Oreg.

The local buyers, in accordance
with eastern orders, reduced their quo-
tations Tuesday from 25 cents to 21 to
23 cents and following the receipt of
additional wires on the demoralization
in the east, they cut the price on choice
mohair to 20 cents.
A few of the large mohair mills in
the eastern states are working on half
time, while the others have closed down
entirely and advised their former em-
ployees to search for work elsewhere, in-
cluding that they will not resume opera-
tions this season.
