THREE POWER PLANTS IN KLAMATH COUNTY

KLAMATH COUNTY, April 5.—Three power plants are now in course of construction in Klamath county. The largest is the Southern Pacific plant at Wheeler creek, which is said to be the largest ever planned by that company, and which will take three years to construct.

The next in importance is the government plant to be built on Lakeview, in conjunction with the Wheeler plant. It will have a capacity of 1000 horsepower and will furnish power for all the pumping stations in Jackson county of the Klamath project. These pumping stations will provide water for the higher lands above the present system of laterals. The water from the Wheeler plant is now being made to pass through the completed Wheeler canal. However, the plant will not be started this year, as the power will not be needed until next year, to be used in the project.

Major's power plant is a short line from the Wheeler plant to the government plant, and will be completed this year and will furnish light and power to the two villages of Wheeler and Marsh. These lines are nearly completed to both points.

These three plants represent the utilization of a very small amount of power being furnished to Klamath county.

IN ROBBED OF FORTUNE BY FAIR CUSTOMS OFFICIAL. SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—E. K. Rogers, a millionaire planter of N. has been adopted by the executive committee in making provision for the business expenditures. Harold Wall announced that contracts have been let for double strings of electric lights on Market street from the Perry building, and for flags and other decorations. The city hall dome will be illuminated during the night of the day of the fleet. A large sign, 300 feet high, will be erected at the building stage, and it will be decorated with flags and other plants.

The top of Telegraph Hill will be surrounded with a massive sign, 400 feet long and 20 feet high, bearing the one word, "Welcome." The device will face the south, so that it may be in full view of the fleet. Thousands of electric lights will pick out the letters, and after dark the greeting will shine before the sailors.

WATERWORKS. Medford, Or., April 2, 1908. Sealed proposals will be received by the City Council of Medford, Oregon, until 9 o'clock p. m., April 21, 1908, for constructing waterworks for the city of Medford.

The work will consist of excavating and backfilling trenches, hauling and laying cast-iron pipe, hauling and placing valves, valve boxes, hydrants and special castings for a distributing pipe system in the city. A bond acceptable to the City Council of Medford will be required for 50 per cent of the contract price.
