RESUME WORK ON KENO CANAL AT KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., April 6.—The reclamation service began work on the Keno canal Tuesday. One hundred head of horses were taken to the work from here. The wages will be 22 cents an hour for eight hours a day, and the indications are that all the men needed can be secured at that rate.
 This work will help Klamath Falls this summer, while the building of the extension of the main canal will make busy times at Merrill, and the work on

the Clear Lake reservoir will make them a center of activity.
 It seems the policy of the government to take advantage of the present low wages and supply of labor, for there will be much irrigation work going on all over the valley.
 More laterals will be built this spring on surveys made last winter, and water will be furnished to a much greater area.
