WASHINGTON, April 20.—The forestry service has just announced the following appointments on Oregon national forest: P. B. Harrington and R. W. Sweetland have been made assistant forest rangers on the northern division of the Cascade national forest; W. E. Graham, George E. Ludford, E. C. Owens and Marion Burlingame have been made forest guards on the same forest. Joseph K. Carper has been appointed a forest guard on the Imnaha national forest, in the northeastern part of the state. He will be assigned to the work of hunting predatory animals on the tracts where the forest service is conducting a series of investigations for the improvement of the founts stop of the range.

ROME, April 20.—An order has been issued countermanding the sending of the Italian squadron to Turkish waters, covering the sultan into granting Italy certain postal privileges in Turkish territory. The Turkish government will grant the privileges demanded by Italy.

HISTORIC LOCATION IS GIVEN FOR PARK

Today Heights, one of the popularly known points on the 250-acre tract of land recently acquired by W. B. Sherman and on which is located the old stagehouse where the Jones family were killed by the Rogue River Indians in the early '50s, was recently the scene of a felicitous and impressive ceremony when a parcel of 15-acres was tendered to Grants Pass for a park. The tract was very appropriately christened "Tuffa Park," in honor of Mrs. Margaret Tuffa, one of the first settlers of this section of the Rogue River valley, and from whom Mr. Sherman purchased the property, says the Courier.

MINING PROPERTY HAS CHANGED HANDS

Elihu Callahan has disposed of six quartz claims on the Muggins side of the Oro Fino mountains, in Siskiyou county, California, to a company from Washington. The price is not stated, but is understood to be \$30,000. Mr. Callahan is to have charge of the property under the new organization. A ten-stamp mill is to be erected soon and if the quartz is found to justify it a cyanide plant is to be established.

MOVEMENT TO SECURE SQUADRON FOR PACIFIC

The commercial organizations of the Pacific states have been invited by the California promotion committee to cooperate in the great movement to bring about the proper naval protection for the Pacific coast by maintaining in the Pacific ocean an adequate fleet of war vessels. Unusual interest has been displayed in this proposition and the people are thoroughly aroused to the necessity of preserving the commercial supremacy of the Pacific ocean to the United States by such means. In the past the Atlantic has been the

home of the American navy, while the Pacific fleet has been in name only, it having consisted of a few cruisers and gunboats. Recently, however, the importance of the Pacific, both commercially and strategically, has been recognized and while in the past the custom has been to speak of the Pacific coast as the back door of the United States that day is now past and our home has two front doors. Besides this, our most important overseas possessions are in the Pacific. These possessions and this commerce must be afforded protection, and such protection can only be given by the means of an adequate naval force.
