The jury, however, was so busy protecting its own honor by indicting Editor Putnam of the Tribune that no action was taken in the school matter.

It is claimed that J. R. Warden, who is acting as a trustee of the district, has no taxable property in it, and has not been a resident of the district for three years past. His claim goes to school district No. 30. His only claim for a home in district 30 is that he has some government land upon which he has not yet received an app.

Under the law there must be ten children in the district in order to hold it. These must be six on the opening day of the school.
