RESOLUTION. Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, the Mayor approving, that the following proposed amendment to the City Charter of the City of Medford be submitted to the legal voters of said city for their approval or rejection, at a special election to be held in said city on the 9th day of May, 1908:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT. Section 100 of the City Charter of the City of Medford do contain as follows:

That Section 100 of an act of the legislature of the State of Oregon, entitled, "An act to repeal an act entitled, 'An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, and limiting its powers and defining the duties of its officers,' and to repeal an act entitled, 'An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon,' approved February 24, 1885," filed in the office of the secretary of state, February 21, 1889, and all amendments thereof, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, and to define its powers and duties," approved February 6, 1901, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, define its powers and duties, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 7, 1905, as amended by the act amendatory thereof, filed in the office of the secretary of state, February 13, 1905, and as further amended by the vote of the people of Medford on the 4th day of June, 1907, and on the 17th day of March, 1908, and the 24 day of April, 1908, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 100. No contract shall be entered into by the city, or any franchise granted by it, for a longer period than ten years, and no franchise shall grant any exclusive right or rights; Provided, that this section shall not be construed to prevent the issuance of the bonds of the city, elsewhere in this charter authorized, for a longer period than ten years, if in the opinion of the council such a longer term will be for the best interests of the city, but no bonds of the city shall be issued for a longer period than 20 years.

Following is the form in which the above amendment will appear upon the ballots: Submitted by Order of the City Council, Charter Amendment. Vote Yes or No. Charter amendment authorizing bonds of the City of Medford to be issued for a period of . . . years. 400 Yes. 401 No.
