POLITICIANS FLEE FROM GUATEMALA

MEXICO CITY, April 30,-Odvice were received here today from Tapach ula and other points near the frontiof Guatemala that scores of political refugees have fled into Mexico from Guatemala during the last few days and that a state of terror exists among the people who have been identified with the element who are opposed to the Cabrera administration.

The recent execution of a number of prominent citizens in addition to eight students of the military academy who were alleged to have been implireated in the plot upon President Ca brera's life has intensified the feeling against habrers and an open aprising is looked for within a few days.

The refugees who have arrived a Tapachula include planters, bankers am men of wealth, and high howiness stard ing. The Mexican government is mass ing a force of several thousand troops upon the frontier bordering on Guarmala.

The Gnatemala government is mobil tring soldiers on that side of the border with the evident intention of repelling a possible invasion from Mexico.
