SUSPECTED MURDERER OF NATHAN WOLFF UNDER ARREST

DOPE FIEND SUSPECTED MURDERER

Alfred H. Martin Cocaine Victim Under Arrest For the Alleged Murder of Nathan Wolff.

PORTLAND, May 5.—A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Edward H. Martin, for the alleged murder of Nathan Wolff, so brutally murdered in his jewelry and pawn shop on Friday night.

All detectives of the department are searching the city and suburbs for Martin, who disappeared from his home on the East Side Sunday evening and has not since been seen by his people.

PORTLAND, May 5.—Edward H. Martin, who is suspected of the murder of Nathan Wolff, was arrested by Detectives Jones and Tichenor at 2 o'clock this afternoon at a lodging house at Union avenue and taken to the police station.

TIME TO SPRAY FOR CODLINS

First Hatching of Moths Last Sunday—First of Worms May 15—Spray With Arsenate of Lead.

Codlin moths are out. The first of the season. They began hatching Sunday, May 3. The first brood of worms will be out May 15. Spraying should be done in advance of the first worms just previous to the latter date to be most effective.

Codlin moths are the bane of the orchardist, or were before the right kind of spray was found and used. Orchard after orchard has been rendered worthless by them, and ear after ear of fruit made unsalable.

The spray used most effectively is 3 pounds of arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water. Two sprayings are usually necessary, the first just before the first worms are out and the second just before the maximum hatch of the first brood, 18 to 20 days after the first date, or June 2 to 5.

This year the cold nights have made the fruit crop more backward than usual, but has not checked the crop of codling moths, which are out on schedule time, according to L. D. Harris, superintendent of the Lewis orchard, who maintains a cage for the study and watching of all kinds of horticultural pests.

BRIGHT CROP PROSPECTS OF JOSEPHINE COUNTY

GRANTS PASS, Or., May 5.—The general development and progress of farm work in Josephine county has been far-reaching during the winter months, and the opening of spring has found many acres ready for fruit trees and berries, which will be set out. A splendid rain has been falling, and this will increase the hap crop and late-sown grain, and gives assurance of heavy yields. A trip over the county shows that an enormous amount of work has been going on in clearing land and planting orchards, besides much has been accomplished in other directions toward developing the farming communities.
