Hero of Merrimac Enthusiastically Greeted by Medford Audience Speaks of Necessity of More Battleships and the Yellow Peril.

Congressman Ridgwood Pearson, Rep. of Alabama, was enthusiastically received by a fair-sized audience at the Medford open house Monday evening. The naval hero makes an eloquent plea for a larger navy as the only protection America can look for from Japan and the only guarantee of the peace of the world. He said in part:

America Balance of Power.
The result of modern science has been to turn every nation of the world to arms. How is it in America? How do we apply steel and steam and electricity, and dynamite. Toward the ends of peace. All of which is well and good. But we must realize that we have come to a crisis. The world needs a restraint to prevent mechs which are heterogeneous from flying at each other's throats.

The peace of Europe is maintained by what is known as the balance of power. It always has been so. The aggressive powers try to tip the scale. The passive nations make an effort to hold the balance. The one great balance of power in the world today is the United States of America.

We have great wealth, but you cannot buy the peace of Europe. Our armies would not do any good, for a great scene extends out from our shores, separating us from them. We cannot preserve the balance of power by argument, but let us try to convince them, anyway, that the best methods of maintaining relations are peaceful ones. Let us get them, if possible, to adopt the plans we have adopted. But, my countrymen, you know as sensible men that the great military monarchs of Europe don't settle their international policies by listening to advice from a republie on the outside. It is a question of the balance of power, my countrymen, it is a question of America having available power which can be felt on the other side of the ocean; a great navy, in other words.

But if the peace of Europe is of great importance to the world, the peace of Asia is of greater importance. An inhibition of space has brought the white man and the yellow man together. Study history, and you will find that who never these races have met long, bloody wars have followed. This was the result when the Huns came up from Asia Minor, when the Ottomans came when the Tartars came in, and when the Russians went down into Manchuria and met the Japanese.

Seeks Military Glory.

Bear in mind that Japan is just emerging from feudalism; just coming of the dark ages. History shows that when nations come out from this condition where the people have been engaged in bitter warfare, they still have the fighting spirit. You must expect that for many years, Japan will have military glory as her aim. The chief thing which we have done is to give the yellow man the white man's inventions of war. In Japan the whole nation has been turned to an application of these things. They don't stop with able-bodied men.

They organize the children, not only in drilling and handling arms, but in inciting the spirit of warfare.

You need not think this spirit will be, or is, confined to Japan. There are upwards of 350,000,000 Chinese. Of these between 15,000 and 20,000 are students in the Japanese schools at the invitation of the Japanese government. There are more than 100,000 Chinese now being taught by these Chinese educated in Japan. They teach one thing above all, which is to hate the foreigner. In this they do not respect their nationality.

Great Crisis Coming.

All this means, men, that a great crisis is ahead of the world. It means that the white race and the yellow race are meeting. The yellow race will not go across Asia to Europe; they will come across the Pacific to America. You may as well set it down for a fact that the yellow man has made up his mind to seize the territory which you occupy, Hindustan, China and Japan, so far as you can stand. Your land is the prize they seek. Don't think you own this country. We came here in the 40s, but if you had looked down from above you would have seen that while the white man was coming over the land to the Pacific slope, the yellow man was coming over the ocean.

Let the 500,000,000 come, and they will not turn out. When they do this it will precipitate a war of such tremendous proportions that it will shake the old world to the foundation. Then your children will be wiped off the face of the earth. A world war will be started which will stretch this earth in blood from pole to pole. Then the world will be dragged back thousands of years into savagery.

Control of Pacific.

America is only asking for a peaceful policy in China, but there are policies of others. All we ask is a policy following which the Christian religion can go across the Pacific and save those lands in the great peace forces. Yet the drift of the world, the white man coming eastward, is creating a condition which must end. That is absolute and only way to account for it.

It is for America to control the Pacific. Not only should we have a fleet permanently in the Pacific as large as that of any nation today, but we should have a fleet with a substantial margin of superiority, so that an attempt to sweep this territory may be stopped in the last.

That is the idea of the American fleet of America and its gallant president.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY DUE TO LOVER'S JEALOUSY

HEPPNER, Ore., May 5.—Crazed with jealousy Sunday afternoon, Henry P. Morrison, a brakeman on the Heppner branch of the O. R. & N., shot and killed his sweetheart, Nora Wright, wounded her escort, Barney Ahalt, and later turned the same gun on himself in an attempt at suicide, in one of the most startling crimes in the history of Morrow county.

The tragedy occurred near Morgan, between Heppner and Gidels.

About two miles below Morgan the wagon road runs close to the track, and it is here that Morrison met Miss Wright, driving in company with Ahalt. He jumped from the sledger, ran out into the road and commanded Ahalt to stop, saying: "You folks had better begin saying your prayers." Then he opened fire with a revolver.

The girl turned partly aside at his command, and the first shot fired struck her in the back of the head, killing her instantly.

Morrison fired again, the bullet striking Ahalt in the shoulder and causing a flesh wound.

Ahalt whipped the team into a run, and, dashing by Morrison, drove into Morgan with the dead girl by his side.

Morrison returned to the sledger and also went back to Morgan. There he found that the girl was dead. Going into the wheat warehouse of Balfour, Guthrie & Co., he placed the muzzle of the gun against his forehead and fired.
