"The object of the English rules i to provide the best and quickest and simples method of bringing before the court the merits involved in any particular case." This, says the New York Times, "is the statement made at the recent meeting of the New York Har association by Mr. Elbridge L. Ad-ams of the New York bar, in summing up the results of an investigation into English rules of civil practice and their working, made at the request of the bound of statutory consolidation, ere ated in 1964."

But this is not the object of the American rules. The object of the American roles, and of the practice un dar them, is to obstruct the presenta tion of the merits of each particular case; to keep the actual facts away from court and jury, to object to all tes-timony that would throw actual light on the case as incompetent and irrelevant, and to fortify the objections by quirks and quibbles built up on the law exidence

Then, if testimony should be got in Then, it togething who are go in, that throws light on the particular case, exception is taken, and offen al-lowed, on one shallow pretext or nu-other; autil, through obstruction and itelas, the proceeding is dropped and the matter is forgetten. Our courts in general are wonder fully food of all this. It covers their proceedings with mystification, in creases their diguity and importance and inspires the beholders with wholesome awe. And yet perhaps the plain way of bringing all the facts out is better. Still, one might say it all depends on the query whether justice is wanted, or not. - Portland Oregonian

### HARVEST WAGES TAKE A

DROP OF 10 PER CENT

Harvest wages in Oregon will be re-duced fully 40 per cent this year, ac cording to D. E. Budd, an employment agent, who was asked in regard to the matter.

The whole country is full of idle men, and Oregon hus her share," he says, "and when harvest time comes around in 1908, you will see men willing to work for \$1.50 a day, where they refused \$2.50 in 1907. The shutting down of the logging camps and rail road construction last fall was a bad blow on the laboring classes in the northwest, and although times are slowly getting better, there are still plenty of idle men in the country.

Last year men could get work any where, and they would not stay more than a few days on one job, because work was so case to get at the next camp or farm. Young men who had been raised in the country had gone away from their homes in large numbers as a result of high wages offered at the big camps. These young men are all at home this year, and they will be ready to do the barvesting when the crops are ripe, without the assist ance of transient men. This condition will reduce the wages offered, and the fatmers will have it all their own way. this season

There are quite a number of idle laborers in Portland now, but they re-fuse what work offers. There is little to do but clear land or work on a farm and this work does not suit them. They hang around the free lunch counters ailing the hard times and hope for a return of the prosperity of the past three years, which I fear is somewhat remote.




