

PEIL DELEGATE TO HEAD CAMP

Medford Man Honored by Modern Woodmen at State Convention—Degree Work Put on by Medford, Ashland and Talent Teams.

Modern Woodmen of America, representatives from nearly every county of Oregon of one of the largest and strongest beneficiary societies in existence, were entertained at Ashland Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, the occasion being the triennial convention for the election of state officers and head camp delegates.

There were 40 state delegates and 500 visitors present. George Peil of Medford, W. T. Vaughn of Portland, G. W. Meadows of Portland, F. B. Curry of La Grande and M. H. Kendall were elected delegates to the head camp. The following were chosen alternates: J. W. McDonald, E. L. Clark, L. E. Freitag, N. C. Kelly and P. M. Powell.

H. A. Turner of Salem was nominated state consul, L. J. Corl of Forest Grove state clerk and Hood River selected as the place of next meeting. First degree work was put on by the Medford team and officers. Both team and officers were well drilled and Medford camp was proud of them.

A banquet was given by the R. N. A. of Ashland, 375 being served to a fine supper. Ashland camp entertained visiting members in royal style.

Second and third degree work was put on by Ashland and Talent teams. St. Johns (Or.) M. W. A. band was in attendance.

ORDINANCE NO. —
An ordinance providing for the employment of a Supervising Engineer for the construction of a gravity water supply system, and fixing his compensation.

The City of Medford doth ordain as follows:

That William J. Roberts be and he is hereby employed as Supervising Engineer of the gravity water supply system of the City of Medford, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, and the Mayor and Recorder are hereby authorized and instructed to execute a written contract of employment with the said William J. Roberts in words and figures as follows, to wit:

This agreement, made and entered into this 1st day of May, 1908, by and between the City of Medford, a municipal corporation of the State of Oregon, hereinafter called the city, and William J. Roberts, hereinafter called the Engineer.

Witnesseth, that in consideration of the premises and of the payments hereinafter provided to be made, the said engineer hereby undertakes and agrees with said city to serve said city as supervising, designing and constructing engineer in designing, supervising and constructing the gravity water supply system for said city, devoting his entire time to said work until the same is completed and connected with the distributing system of said city, and to accept as full compensation for his said services the payments hereinafter provided, said services to begin upon completion of the preliminary surveys for said work.

And in consideration of said services, and as full compensation therefor, the said city agrees to pay to said engineer the sum of \$500 upon July 1, 1908, and the sum of \$300 upon the 1st day of each calendar month thereafter until the full sum of \$5000 shall have been paid, and thereafter and upon completion and final acceptance of said system by said city, the additional sum of \$1600, making in all a total compensation of \$7500, said compensation to include all expenses of said engineer incurred in carrying on said work and rendering said services; but in the event that said system be completed in less than 18 months, then upon completion and acceptance thereof, the said city shall forthwith pay to said engineer the balance of said total sum of \$7500 remaining unpaid.

In witness whereof the said city has caused these presents to be executed by the Mayor and Recorder, and the said engineer has hereunto set his hand and seal the day and year first above written. Executed in duplicate.

CALIFORNIA MACHINE ROUTED IN PRIMARIES

Lincoln-Roosevelt League Wins Decisive Victory and Will Control Convention—Popular Revolt Against Herrin and Southern Pacific Domination.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—Returns from Tuesday's primary election show a decisive victory for the Lincoln-Roosevelt League over the machine forces directed by William P. Herrin of the Southern Pacific company.

With 53 of the 67 delegates from San Francisco, a clean sweep in Fresno and the San Joaquin valley, a majority of nearly three to one of the delegates from Alameda county, a majority in Los Angeles county and an 11 to 5 victory in Sacramento, the Lincoln-Roosevelt league was overwhelmingly triumphant in all the Southern Pacific machine strongholds.

Estimates based on the returns from smaller districts, where the league won its fight for delegates, and on the personnel of delegations from counties in which the league had not perfected organization, or in which primary elections were not held, indicate that league forces will control the state convention. There are at least 280 delegates definitely on the side of the league. Added to these are some 50 who are in divided delegations and more than 80 who are from neutral counties, unpledged and unaffiliated.

CENTRAL POINT NEWS.

Mr. Parker seems to be a victim of overwork, as during the last two months the business at this place has been more than the business of any four months in the history of the station.

Now that Central Point has a marshal on salary, who will devote his entire time to looking after the peace and well-being of the city, it is to be expected that the rowdyism and drunkenness that has been so prevalent lately will be stopped. The town lockup has been put in good condition for the accommodation of guests and the mayor and all other city officials are standing squarely behind the marshal and recorder in the enforcement of law and the suppression of rowdyism and hoodlumism. And it is time something was done. When young boys are brought home completely paralyzed from bad booze; when bad games are interfered with by drunken men and boys, and when bootleggers and jug lines flourish as they do here, it is time something was done to stop these practices.

Friends of G. G. Selby of this city were shocked and grieved by the receipt of a telegram from Mrs. Selby last Saturday evening announcing the death of her husband, which occurred that day at Silver City, New Mexico. Mrs. Selby expected to start back here with the body Sunday evening. No further details have been received and it is not known just when the funeral will be held. The Modern Woodmen, of which order Mr. Selby was a member, are making all arrangements for the burial.

The matter of waterworks was discussed informally by the city council and an informal report of the water committee was submitted. It was the sense of the mayor and council that a competent engineer be employed to survey and map the town for street grades, water system, sewers, etc., and to furnish an estimate of cost of water system. Letters from engineers with whom the committee has been conferring were read and discussed and the mayor was requested to arrange for a conference with engineer Cummins at an early date before further action is taken.
