

IF YOU WANT TO GET A SECOND HOMESTEAD

Any person who has already proved up on a homestead of 160 acres under the old law can take another; and if he is entitled to another will be compelled to live on it and comply with the other requirements in respect to residence.

The act of February 8, 1902, allows a person otherwise qualified to make a second homestead entry where such person has made and lost, forfeited or abandoned a former homestead entry prior to February 8, 1902, and such former entry was not cancelled for fraud or abandoned or relinquished for a consideration.

The person applying to make a second homestead entry must file in the local land office an application to enter a specific tract of land and state under oath the facts respecting his former entry and its relinquishment, etc. This must be corroborated by the oath of one or more persons having knowledge of the facts.

The act of June 5, 1900, allows a second homestead entry to a person otherwise qualified who, prior to that date, made homestead entry and commuted the same under the provisions of section 2301, revised statutes, and amendments thereto, but such second entry is not subject to commutation.

The act of May 22, 1902, allows a second homestead entry to a person otherwise qualified who, prior to May 17, 1900, made and perfected a homestead entry, paying therefor the price provided under the law opening the land for settlement, but to which land, had he not perfected title prior to the date mentioned, he would have been entitled to receive a patent without payment under the "free homes act." Said act does not allow commutation unless proof submitted on land first entered shows five years' residence.

RED MEN'S CELEBRATION OF ST. TAMMANY'S DAY

Next Tuesday is the anniversary of St. Tammany, the Red Men's patron saint, and the day will be handsomely observed throughout the land.

CHINAMAN PERFECTS A NODORLESS ONION

The famous plant wizard, Burbank, will have to share a part of plant improvement fame with a native of the flowery kingdom, if the following onion story from Exeter, Talah county, is not another nature fake.

Wing Hop, an elderly Chinaman, who has been gardening in this state for the past 30 years, now living at the China gardens between here and Visalia, declares that he has perfected what he terms an odorless onion. Many years ago the old fellow worked for Luther Burbank at Santa Rosa, and there gathered from him some of the progressive ideas of horticulture and gardening. It was from the famous flower wizard that he conceived the idea of growing an onion of that kind as Burbank one day remarked to him in a joking way that if he could perfect an odorless onion he would have his fortune made. Their conversation probably never again entered the head of the famous plant wizard, but it remained in the slow, plodding brain of the Chinaman, and he has spent his time trying experiments in that line. He is now joyful over the thought that in the last days of his life he has perfected the plant. To no one will he tell the secret of his work, but he has offered many samples of the vegetable to friends, who all tell the same story that the onion is as perfect as any they ever ate, but lacking either smell or taste of the ordinary kind.

To be sure the plants are yet young, about as large as one's thumb. The grower is now planning to go to his own country to spend the last days of his life in affluence. SPORTING NEWS.

Orvie Overall, the erstwhile Oregon player, is starting out to break the great record of last year when he won 15 straight games. He has not lost a game since August 10 last year, and has pitched 12 championship contests, including the 12 inning draw that opened the world's series.

Joe Thomas, manager of Boer Unhols, is somewhat perturbed because the fans are a bit skeptical regarding the South African fighter. "He's no Tommy Sullivan or Eddie Kelly," said Thomas. "He is a good, tough boy and he thinks he has an excellent chance to beat Joe Gans. He will rush the champion and give him something to think about. They talk about his being easy for Gans. Well, I am willing to bet \$5000 that Gans can't knock him out inside of 20 rounds."

For 20 innings, the last 14 of them without a score or an error, the Aberdeen and Butte teams vainly fought Thursday for enough to win the game. Such baseball has never been seen on the coast before. Ennon Callif was the hero of those long 20 innings. Only in the first was Butte able to hit him effectively, while during the 20 innings he struck out 16 men and allowed but ten hits. Jocko Thomas, the Butte pitcher, was almost as effective, allowing but 14 hits, but striking out only five men.
