GOOD BERRIES ARE IN STRONG DEMAND

Strawberries are the active feature of the fruit market just now, and the demand is so strong that good berries clean up about as fast as they come in. Yesterday's receipts of Californias were the largest of the season thus far and at the clase of business last night there was practically nothing left that was at all salable. Receipts today were moderate and the demand was such as to take them about as fast as they were unloaded on the street.

The berries now coming from Cali-fornia, says the Oregonian, are of much better quality than those of a week ago, but in each shipment there is still ne inferior fruit. Prices have not as yet changed materially, ther ange being from \$1,25 to \$1.75 a crate.

A few small shipments of good Ore gon berries have come in, but the bulk of the receipts so far showed up very poorly on arrival. Next week, if the weather is favorable, there will be larger offerings of good fruit from The Datles and Southern Oregon points. At present homogrown berries are quoted at 10 to 1212 cents a pound. Receipts of cherries from California

thus far have been very light, but suf-ficient for the demand, which is never strong at this time of the year. Offerings of fair quality are held at \$1 to \$1.50 a box.

In the apple market the end of the season is not far away. The demand for the staple fruit is stendy and prices are about the same as for two months past, the range being \$1,25 to \$3 a box, according to quality.
