IMPORTANT EVIDENCE MISSING IN THE WOLFF CASE PORTLAND, May 16.—That the assassin of Pawabroker Nathan Wolff, who was chopped to death in his establishment on the evening of May 1, may have returned to the scene of his crime after the discovery of the tragedy, and by mingling with the crowd in the store, secured possession of highly incriminating evidence under the very eyes of the detectives, is indicated by the series of sensational developments in the case which have come to light today. Equally as mystifying as the murder itself and tending to establish, in a measure, the innocence of Edward H. Martin, who is awaiting trial in the circuit court for the crime, is the fact that the watch of the murdered pawabroker and a hat which was lying behind the showcase on the north side of the store at the time Mrs. Wolff entered the place with Watchman Robinson, have mysteriously disappeared. Although Wolff's timepiece was picked up from the floor near the rear safe in the store by some person after whose identity has not yet been determined, and Mrs. Wolff emphatically declares that she saw a tan soft hat when she entered the store, neither of these articles ever came officially into the possession of the police or coroner, and there is consequently sufficient ground for the theory that they were spirited away for some ulterior motive. NEW FRUIT BOX REVOLUTIONIZES THE TRADE PORTLAND, Or., May 16.—With a market whose extent is shown by the fact that 5,000,000 fruit boxes are shipped from Portland every season and an equal or larger number from Grays Harbor, Wash., it is no wonder that a Portland man, C. D. Edwards, feels enthusiastic about a new folding fruit box which he has recently invented. The Edwards box has no metal whatever in it, the bottom, a separate piece, fitting in without the use of tacks or wire sewing. It can be shipped flat, and the slunks lying closely together in the car will not dry out, so Mr. Edwards declares. The factory at Hoquiam, Wash., controls the patent on the folding box now in use, and has received orders for as much as 35 car loads at one time. Mr. Edwards, who is connected with the Portland Basket & Handle company, Fulton, says that one man and a boy will manufacture his new metal box as rapidly as ten girls working on the wire-sewed boxes. His patent is now pending. There are five fruit box factories in Portland, one in St. Johns, and a small factory in Seattle, as well as the large plant at Hoquiam. The average being planted to small fruit is said, however, to be increasing faster than the increase in the manufacture of fruit boxes. Since it becomes possible to ship boxes flat, the mills on the Pacific coast, using spruce lumber, have been able to build up a splendid business with eastern fruit growers. REAL ESTATE TRANSFERS. H.
