Believes in People's Rule.

"I am no recent convert to the cause of popular government," said Gover-nor Chamberlain. "In 1892 I championed the initiative and referendum.

Afterwards I advocated the direct primary and every measure that has been before the people for an enlargement of their powers. I have always believed in Statement No. 1, which simply means the right of the people to elect a sen-

"'Hefore the primaries, Mr. Fulton said that he believed in Statement No. 1 personally, but thought it should be left to each legislative candidate as to whether he should indorse it. Mr. Cake came out flat-footed for Statement No. I, and because he did so, was nominated over Mr. Fulton.

Cake Against Statement No. 1. "No sooner was be nominated than Mr. Cake flopped on Statement No. 17 but now takes the same position that Mr. Fulton took before the primaries-that Statement No. 1 should be left to the individual candidate for the legis-laure. He refuses to support Statement

Alleged Abuse of Pardons.

"When rirst elected governor, I be gan a thorough study of the penal sys tem. As a result, I stopped the cus-tom of publishing to the world the name of released convicts whose terms had expired. I did this so that they might have a chance to secure work and begin lite anew without being branded as criminals.

'I abolished the system of flogging and other physical punishments in flieted upon prisoners. Finally I abol-ished the striped suits as causing un-necessary humiliation. The objects of imprisonment are to punish the crim-inal, to protect society and to care for the soul of the criminal. If these ends are served, the ends of justice have been met. So far that large class of criminals, not hardened offenders, but men ranging from 15 to 25, serving their first offense, I devised a special parole or pardon, which is granted only on the promise of the prisoner and his friends that be behave, report once a month to prison authorities and agree to drink no liquor of any kind during

Not All Were Released.

"While I have signed many paydons, it does not mean that I freed all from prison by it. In many cases the men left the penitentiary many years ago, and have behaved themselves since, and were granted pardons simply to re-store them to the rights of citizen-ship. Many of the pardons that I have signed were issued to this class, men who had already served their prison terms and were discharged long before

And it is better to err on the side of mercy than to take away from a man chance for Carey act. eformation.
