ROAD ALONG RIM OF CRATER LAKE

Proposed-Runs Along Tops of Peaks and Through Tremendous Gorges-Garden of Stone Pillars,

O. C. Applegate of Klamath Palls has written a letter concerning the proposed seenle road about Crater lake. The building of this highway would add a great deal to the attractiveness of Oregon's wonder lake, and increase the number of tourists, directly benefiting Applegate says:

"It is a source of gratification to the people of the Klamath country, as indeed it should be to the people of the state generally who appreciate the fact that Crater lake is the crowning scenic wonder of our picturesque Cascade chain, to see that Senator Fulton has backed up Superintendent Arant's prop osition to have \$10,000 appropriated for the improvement of the park by secur ing an amendment to the sundry civil bill in the senate. It is to be hoped that no conference committee ax or other agency will be used to reduce this conservative sum, for even \$10,000. is far too small a sum for the purpose desired. Superintendent Arant asked for something less than \$11,0000 and, before Senator Fulton's action, this had been cut down to \$3000, a sum wholly inadequate, as "for the compensation of the superintendent and his necessary assistants in the patrol of the park should come out of the sum, practically nothing would be left to advance the work of road making in the park. Along Rim of Crater.

"The seenic road could be built at such an elevation that all points of interest on the rim would be easily accessible from it. The distance required to encircle the lake and the rugged portion of its rim would probably be something over 30 miles, and would trav

erse a region of splendid natural beau-ty. This scenie road, eneireling the great eliffs, and erags, with the most wonderful lake in the world on one side and a panoramic view of vast areas of mountains, valleys and lakes, and the lengues and lengues of splendid forests on both sides of the Cascade chain, looking upon these varying views from the very summit of the mountains, would probably make this the greatest scenic road in America.

"The writer was with Secretary Gar-field last summer when he scaled the rugged peak on the rim of Crater lake, which now bears his name, and discussed with him the idea of construct ing such a secule read as we have described, and he, full of enthusiastic admiration of Crater lake and its sur-toundings, heartly approved of the idea. He will surely take a deep interest in carrying the enterprise to a successful

Build Third at Once.

"Mr. Arant's plan was to undertake this summer to open nearly a third of the scenic road, and, in company with the other mountaineers, made a careful exploration, to determine the practica ters on Annie creek, vin Sun creek can you, Kiser's falls, Garfield and Apole gate peaks to the emyon of Sand creek and with the greatest success; for while this 10 or 12 miles is the roughest portion of the rim, a road can be made, with an outlay of say \$15,000 or less that would be an easy one for carriages of all kinds, including those driven by motor power.

"The upper valley of San creek, through which the road will pass, is a grassy area where thousands of tour-ists could spread their tents among the hemlock trees about the purling brooks and enjoy an ideal outing, with two great mountain walls rising to a height of 1000 feet on either hand, and Kiser's fall, 300 feet high, hanging like a white scarf from the escarpment on the west. SOUTHERN PACIFIC PLANS NEW LINE

a Connection With Oregon & Eastern and From Alturas Through Modoc Lassen, Plumas and Tehama Counties

The Goose Lake and Southern Railway ocmpany has been formed, and its articles of incorporation filed in the office of the county clerk of Shusta county, California, showing the declared intention to build a standard gauge main line from a connection with the both Klamath Falls and Medford, Mr. Oregon & Eastern railway at the Oregon and California boundary line on th eastern shore of Goose lake to a point in Shasta county at or near the town of Anderson, where a junction is to be formed with the Southern Pacific rail

That iti s a branch of the Southers Pacific is shown by the personnel of the new corporation, composed of E. E. Calvin, general manager of hie South orn Pacific company; William F. Her-rin, chief of the Southern Pacific law department; William Hood, chief en-gineer of the Southern Pacific company, and W. R. Scott and L. J. Wileutt, both

officials of the same company.

The papers filed show that Calvin and Herrin have each subscribed \$200, 000 and the other three incorporator \$2000 each. Ten per cent of the whole amount, or \$40,600, has been paid in, as certified to by Secretary of State Curry, The capitalization is \$13,398,000 or \$33,0000 a mile.

It is also the intention of the com-many to build a branch line from Alluras through Modoc, Lassen, Plamas and Tehama counties to a connection with the Southern Pacific railroad at or near the town of Vina. This line is to be 171 miles in length, while the main line will have an estimated length of 227 miles, making a total of 406 miles.

These projected lines are intended to head off Thomas B. Walker's proposed milroad or possible feeders of the West-ern Pacific and at the same time shut out the Sacramento valley and Eastern from proceeding up the Pit river pas-to a transcontinental connection cast of he Sierras.

INVESTIGATE POSSIBILITIES OF TURPENTINE IN OREGON

APPROPRIATIONS EXCEED LAST SESSION BY \$300,000,000

WASHINGTON, May 21,-The prein a session of congress to end this week is a record-breaker. The appropriations of this session so far authorized ex-ceed those of the first session of the 9th congress by more than \$300,000, The total appropriations made up to this time aggregate approximately \$551,844,807. This amount will be in ereased by the general deficiency and omnibus public buildings bills and such other measures as may go through be-fore adjournment.

The session ins also established a high record for the number of bills, res-alutions introduced and considered and obitions infroduced and consumeral and for the transaction of executive busi-mess. There have been 7127 bills in-traduced in the senate and 21,940 in the hause. In the senate 90 joint resolu-tions were offered, of which 30 were passed and 9 have become laws.
