JAPAN BRINGING ORDER FROM CHAOS

Ambassador Takahira Explains Japan's Cause in Far East-Says Korea and Manchuria Had Allowed Themselves to Become Disorganized

The following is an abstract of the address delivered by Baron Gogora Takakirs, Japenese ambassador, at Lake Moltonk conference on international ar-

modern nation, I may say without tear of being minumerstand that she is holding her own despite the vicissitudes of life through which he has been pass ing during the last half century. The increasant criticium and complaints that have been brought against her regardour nation in our new field of industrial activity in Manchucia; others in the less organized kingdom under our protection. These are countries from which Japan acquired in former times her system of government, education and even religion, by means of which we regulated our political and social life.

Chaos Formerly Reigned.

St. Johns Business Men Organize Fight Prohibition-Anti-Saloon Agi Who Neither Pay Taxes nor Reside in City to Vote Upon Question.

ST. JOHNS, May 23,—Because the residents of Portland will vote on the saloon question in this city, more than 30 of the most prominent business a here have declared that they will take a personal interest in the campaign and fight the "dry" element to the last ditch. They have signed a petition to the voters, asking that the anti-saloor measure be defeated.
