

**COLVIG QUERIES  
ABOUT DANCING**

**Rev. Mr. Reuter's Attention Called to What Is Going On in Methodist Church Conference Relative to Eliminating Laws Condemning Amusements.**

To the Editor: I wish you would call the attention of the Rev. Mr. Reuter to what is going on in the high councils of the Methodist church. At a large gathering of Epworth leaders held in Portland during the past week I noted that the question was discussed: "Should Specification No. 248, which condemns dancing, card-playing, theater-going and horse-racing, be eliminated from the Methodist discipline?" In answering the query, Dr. Waters, a prominent Methodist, said: "This question is now pending before the general conference to the church at Baltimore." He also said that he favored its elimination, and that it would be eliminated either this or some future general conference. He declared that it was useless to condemn these particular things, and leave a longer list of other things not condemned—some of them worse than any of these. What I would like to know is, "Is Dr. Waters' opinion in behalf? He seems to be progressive. Respectfully, WM. M. COLVIG.

The report of the Epworth League meeting in Portland referred to above is taken from the Portland Journal and is as follows:

Another large gathering of Epworth leaders was present at this morning's session of their annual convention in the University Park Methodist church.

An interesting feature of yesterday's afternoon session was the question box conducted by Dr. D. A. Waters. Among the other questions submitted to Dr. Waters from members of the audience was "Should specification No. 248, which condemns dancing, card-playing, theater-going and horse racing, be eliminated from the Methodist discipline?" In answering the query Dr. Waters called attention to the fact that this question is now pending before the general conference of the church at Baltimore, and that a strong petition was sent from Oregon against its elimination. He said, however, that he favored its elimination and that it would be eliminated at either this or some future conference. He declared that it was useless to condemn these particular practices and leave a still longer list of other things not condemned which are just as bad and some of them worse than any of these.

**EXCITEMENT OVER NEW ELDORADO CONTINUES**

Excitement in the new gold camp on Williams creek, a few miles south of Grants Pass, recently opened up by the Harrison brothers, continues and the volume of yellow metal being taken out is daily increasing. The actual facts relative to this new discovery are almost unbelievable, and should the same amount of gold be taken out in Nevada, Colorado or California, the future would, ere this, have surpassed the excitement following the discoveries at Goldfield or Tonopah, says the Grants Pass Courier.

Frank Johnson, proprietor of the Layton hotel of this city and his brother Dan, who are brothers-in-law of the Harrison brothers, discoverers of the new Eldorado, came in from the new camp Sunday evening after having spent a couple of days at the diggings. Both brought in some fabulously rich specimens. Both had been over the grounds now being worked by the Bascom and Jones brothers, and confirm all the exciting reports heretofore brought in from that section.

Frank Johnson in a conversation with a Courier representative Monday morning, said that the Harrison and Jones boys between them are now taking out from \$1000 to \$2000 per day of almost pure gold. Thursday of last week Bob Hart Harrison, senior member of the Hilt

rison brothers, took out one pan of dirt which yielded \$600. While this is a small pan compared with some that have already taken out it is a sample of almost dirty merchandise, and ought to be sufficient to startle the average miner if not the general public.

Ten or 12 claims have been staked off in the new camp within the past week and the indications are that a big rush will soon follow. Many inquiries have already been received from miners in Nevada, California, Washington and various towns throughout the state of Oregon about the new mining result of the political givings the latter in Portland papers.
