MEDFORD HORSE TO LEAD ROSE CARNIVAL PAGEANT

F. O. Downing, one of the most enthusiastic horsemen of the northwest and a prominent member of the Portland Hunt club, has been selected as grand marshal of the rose festival and street parade of floral decorated vehicles, competitive floats, equestrian clubs etc. This splendid pageant, which will contain more than 20 divisions and will embrace not less than 600 decorated saddle horses and ponies, pleasure and commercial teams of every kind and description, will be held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning, June 4. It will be not less than five miles in length and promises to be one of the most spectacular pageants ever devised on the Pacific coast. Grand Marshal Downing will select his official staff and aides within the next two or three days. He will lead the parade mounted on his famous thoroughbred, "Stinky," formerly owned by Mrs. C. H. Edmunds of Medford.

FORMER CITY RECORDER IN TROUBLE IN ARIZONA

C. P. Snell, formerly city recorder at Medford, who afterwards turned state's evidence in government land fraud cases and was rewarded by employment in the secret service department, is under arrest in Flagstaff, Ariz., upon an indictment for attempted extortion and threatening Perrin, one of the defendants in the Perrin-Hyde cases. He is alleged to have attempted to secure money for contracts, letters and telegrams sent by Perrin. An anonymous letter, dated June 14, 1905, at San Francisco, terminating with the statement, "You will remember me, as George," says in part: "Benon intimates he is not going to the penitentiary without taking others with him, though I don't know who he intends implicating, but if I were you I would try to get hold of all those contracts I made with him and all letters and telegrams you sent pertaining to them."

COUNTER COMPLAINT IN HART DIVORCE CASE

The divorce case brought by John Hart against Susan Hart of Eagle Point alleging desertion, was met by a cross complaint on the part of the defendant, alleging cruelty. The defense showed that the plaintiff had visited the defendant at her home last January. Decision was taken under advisement. W. L. Vawter is attorney for the plaintiff and W. M. Colvig for the defendant.

Information reaching here from Sacramento is to the effect that Thomas Ahern, superintendent of the Shasta division of the Southern Pacific, will be transferred to Oakland to be superintendent of the western division. It is stated that the change in superintendents is to be made right away on account of the alleged failure of the present Oakland superintendent to make good.

TIMBER LANDS TO BE PATROLED FOR FIRE

Plans have been perfected for the patrolling of the timber possessions of the Western Pacific Land & Timber company, Oshkosh Land & Timber company, Southern Pacific company, Hopkins Timber company, and Weyerhaeuser Land company. The tract owned by these companies comprises about 600,000 acres and extends from the California line to the reserve on the north. The tract has been divided into five districts and a patrolman will be in charge of every one of the districts. The patrolmen of the five districts in this section will be under the supervision of J. P. Kimball, and will be stationed as follows: District No. 1, Lands in the immediate vicinity of Polegama with John Furber as patrolman; No. 2, lands in vicinity of Aspen lake with J. Y. Johnson as patrolman; No. 3, lands near Spineer's, south of Klamath river, with Harry Pearson in charge; No. 4, lands between Oleson and Aspen lake, with M. H. Wampler in charge; No. 5, lands along west side of Upper lake, with K. P. Hamilton as patrolman.

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WATER IS TURNED ON HERMISTON PROJECT

PENDLETON, Ore., May 28.—One thousand people from Umatilla and surrounding counties witnessed the formal opening of the Umatilla government irrigation project at Hermiston Wednesday. An excursion train of eight coaches was run from this city. The great gates of the reservoir were opened promptly by government engineers and the water from the reservoir poured into the distributing canals and out over the land of the project, which comprises 22,000 acres of fine sandy soil adapted to every crop of the temperate zone. The crowds swarmed over the entire project, viewing its various headgates, inspecting the reservoir, headgates, towers, feed and distributing canals, pipeline and other interesting details of the \$1,000,000 project.
