

THE MEDFORD WISSEMENTS

MARSHFIELD ALSO TO RELY UPON CHARTER

Case Is Similar to Medford—Local Option Law to Be Tested as Privilege Supersedes State Authority—Liquor Dealers Will Appeal to Supreme Court

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 3.—There has arisen a legal point in regard to the local option fight in this county which may mean a lawsuit after the election. It is announced that if the county should go dry the liquor interests will go to the supreme court for a decision as to how it affects Marshfield.

Since the local option law was adopted Marshfield was granted a charter in which it states that the city council has the right to license, tax and regulate the saloons. Some of the lawyers hold that this means that it is entirely up to the city council as to whether or not there shall be saloons and that, even though the county should vote dry, as a whole, it will not affect this city.

At least this is the claim that is made, and it is declared that the saloons will not close until there has been a decision from the supreme court.

WESTERN STATES TO GET FOREST RESERVE COIN

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The fact that western states are hereafter to receive 25 per cent of the receipts of forest reserves in lieu of 10 per cent which they have received during the past two years, is due very largely to the work of Senator Fulton and Representative Hawley of Oregon. It was Mr. Fulton who proposed the amendment.

H. Miller and L. Purdie, receiving total vote of 1811 against 1661 for the election is due simply to the fact that the popular election of the county was held in the county.

EVEN FIG LEAVES BARRED IN THIS NATURE COLONY

NEW YORK, June 2.—A "simple life paradise colony," where men, women and children will go about naked, and where the men are never to cut their hair or beards, will be started this fall near Vera Cruz, Mex., by Gustaf H. Ander, well known in socialist and anarchist circles. More than 50 persons have become his followers and have promised to sail for the tropics when he does.

Mr. Ander is spreading "simple life thoughts" and "paradise breezes," giving the plans for this unique colony throughout the country and expects by September 1 to collect at least 500 colonists who have the same "free" ideas that he has.

C. T. Spooner of Seattle won the men's open championship of Oregon at the Waverly golf links last week at the state tournament from Gordon Voorhees of Portland with three up and two to play in 36 holes.

BRYAN'S CHAIRMAN IN CAMPAIGN DEAD

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Former Senator James K. Jones of Arkansas died yesterday at his home after a brief illness of heart failure, aged 69 years. He was one of the leading democrats and was sent to congress from 1855 to 1903. He was one of the strongest supporters of Bryan, having, as chairman of the democratic national committee, conducted the campaign of 1896 and 1900. Since leaving the senate in 1903 he conducted a law practice in this city and has not actively engaged in politics.

CONGRESS SPENDS BIGGEST SUM IN COUNTRY'S HISTORY

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Representative Tawney of Minnesota, chairman of the committee on appropriations, today presented to the house his annual review of fiscal appropriations and expenditures. The keynote of his speech was sounded in the declaration that "the insistent demands of the people and of the public service result in an increased aggregate when enacted into law," and the "efforts of the majority to maintain a policy of greater economy were frustrated by an obstructive and recalcitrant minority."

Tawney stated the total appropriations of the session to be \$851,088,670. He said the total revenues of the government estimated to congress by the secretary of the treasury are placed at \$878,123,011; that in addition to the authorized expenditure of \$851,088,670 for the operation of the government during the next fiscal year, appropriations are also made as follows:

In deficiency acts, exclusive of \$12,466,750 for public buildings authorized at this session, \$44,529,223; for requirements of the sinking fund, \$18,000,000; for redemption of national bank notes, \$25,000,000; for construction of the Panama canal (bonds to be issued), \$29,187,000; for miscellaneous and special objects, \$1,000,000, including \$250,000 for the relief of storm and flood sufferers in the southern states, and \$403,000 for the payments of claims of the Roman Catholic church in the Philippine islands, making a grand aggregate for the next fiscal year of \$1,008,804,894.

Tawney said the estimates submitted to congress by the executive as a basis for the appropriations made amounted to \$1,079,449,288, or an excess of \$70,440,394 over the total of the appropriations of this session and an excess of \$156,651,145 over all the appropriations made at the last session.

The grand total of appropriation made at this session exceeds those of any last session by \$88,000,750.

WOMEN CROSS CONTINENT IN AUTO FROM

PORTLAND, Or., June 2.—Fernando Nelson, the wealthy San Francisco motorist, who arrived in Portland Friday after one of the most thrilling automobile trips ever taken in the west, will have his record-breaking White steamer decorated with the finest of Portland roses and enter it in the festival parade here Wednesday.

"Words are inadequate to explain the condition of the roads we were forced to traverse," said Nelson. "I can only say that I am satisfied to let the time of 81 hours and 31 minutes stand at present for the record trip between San Francisco and Portland."

"I am told it is the first authentic non-stop record, and if any automobile drivers think they can lower my time I'll be only too glad to see them make the attempt. Later in the year I shall start out again."

WALNUT CULTURE PASSES EXPERIMENTAL STAGE

Walnut culture in Oregon some time ago passed the experimental stage. Farmers of the Willamette valley, and especially in Yamhill county, are gradually supplementing their prune orchards with walnut groves. Since the formation of walnut clubs at McMinnville and Oak Grove there has been increased interest in the culture, with marked results in the number of acres being devoted to what is in some quarters still referred to as a "new industry in Oregon."

BRYAN DENIES PARKER'S SELECTION FOR CHAIRMAN

NORFOLK, Va., June 2.—In conversation today with a representative of the Associated Press, William J. Bryan denied the statement made relative to Judge Parker being chairman of the resolutions committee at the Denver convention.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC IS INDICTED FOR REBATES

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 2.—The federal grand jury Monday returned a large number of indictments, including three against the Southern Pacific, on alleged rebates in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. Twenty-nine counts were contained in the three indictments. The officials of the company are cited to appear on June 25 to answer to the charge.
