WASHINGTON OARSMEN RACE CALIFORNIA EIGHTS

SEATTLE, Wash., June 2.—This afternoon the pistol will sound which will start the creek eight oars crew of the University of Washington and the University of California on their row down the waters of Lake Washington. Manager Rasmussen announced that the race would start, rain or shine. Only rough water will prevent the race and the lake was as calm as a mirror this morning. The crews are in excellent condition.

Washington oarsmen have trained for five months and Coach Conibear declares they are in perfect condition and they will have no excuse if they are defeated.

Coach Garnett of California is also satisfied with the condition of his men with one exception, Harold Ashley, No. 5, has a sore hand. In case he cannot row his oar will be taken by Randall.

The crews have a similar stroke. The Washington boys have a longer drive and the California crew hit a slightly speedier pace.

The southern boys will probably hit up a 35 stroke clip.

The Washington oarsmen will row about 30 or 31.

BATTLING NELSON IS CONFIDENT OF VICTORY

PORTLAND, June 2.—Batting Nelson, who is scheduled to fight Joe Gans four rounds for the lightweight championship of the world at Colma, California, July 4, arrived in Portland yesterday for a week's engagement at a local theatre. Bat will spar three rounds each afternoon and evening with Jack Grace, the traveling fighter. Grace is known everywhere, for he has fought in every principal city in the world.

Nelson has a badly swollen eye, which he received in the sparring match with Grace at Seattle; the latter's wrist having bruised the member. Nelson will probably let several ambitious local boys go on with him, as there is an opportunity of learning a great deal of inside boxing in a few rounds with the Durable Dane.

Nelson was a great drawing card in Seattle and the theatrical managers wanted to bill him for the entire circuit, but his local engagement will be the last until after his fight with the negro champion.

BURNS' DEMANDS ARE A DISGRACE TO THE SPORT

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 2.—Concerning the treatment of Jack Johnson, the colored pugilist, by Tommy Burns, the Canadian boxer, James J. Jeffries today expressed himself in forcible terms of disapproval.

"If Burns intends to fight the black man at all, he should do so now under terms that will not cause the sporting men of America to blush in shame for the man they now call champion," said Jeffries.

"I consider Burns' demand for \$30,000, win or lose, or draw, to be absolutely ridiculous. The one-sided arrangement that he is trying to put through on Johnson is a disgrace to the sport."

BRIDE TRAVELS AROUND WORLD FOR CEREMONY

BALTIMORE, Md., June 2.—According to news received in this city today, Miss Nellie Matthews, daughter of Nicholas M. Matthews, a prominent Baltimorean, will be married in Hongkong, China, after a journey of 15,000 miles. The bridegroom is to be Ensign Reed M. Pawell of Lincoln, Neb., commandant of the United States gunboat Samar, stationed at Hongkong.

Matthews was a member of the class of and met his bride at the Annapolis naval academy, several years ago. A dance there school he was ordered to the Philippines and stayed there two years. The wedding was first announced for Easter, 1906.
