

# FAIR BIGAMIST IS STILL ALIVE

Eighteen Year Old Double Bride Reported Dead is Seen Upon Streets of Los Angeles.

PORTLAND, Or., June 9.—Mrs. Ruth Kinney Goldie Ellis Beede, who was reported to have died a few weeks ago, is alive and residing at Los Angeles, according to a prominent attorney of that city who is visiting here and who claims to have seen her on the streets there several days ago.

Mrs. Ellis Beede is the beautiful 18-year-old heiress to a \$200,000 California estate, who figured prominently in the beauty contest recently conducted by the Portland Journal. She left Portland hurriedly for California a few months ago, when one of the two men who claim to be her husbands, applied to the authorities for a warrant for her arrest charging her with bigamy.

Her marriage two years ago to J. T. Ellis, a Portland attorney, created a sensation because of the fact that the bride appeared at the altar in short skirts of a schoolgirl. She has never since worn the attire of a grown woman.

A divorce was later granted to the bride Ellis appealed to the supreme court of the state and a few months ago secured a reversal of the decree.

In the meantime the girl had become the wife of Charles Beede, a floorwalker in a department store. When Ellis heard of this he applied to the authorities for a warrant for the arrest of his former wife, but discovered that she had disappeared, accompanied by her foster mother, Mrs. Kinney.

Several weeks later a telegram was received by Mr. Kinney stating that his foster daughter had died. No details were given and he immediately departed for the California city.
