BOURNE BOBS UP TO STAMPEDE CONVENTION INTO NAMING TEDDY

Big Bill Uniformly Successful in Landing Delegates From Contested States--Entire South for Ohioan-- Tea and Taffy for a Woman's Suffrage Plank --Odell out for Vice Presidency--Tariff Plank

CHICAGO, June 11.—Enough pledged Taft delegates to insure his nomination on the first ballot had been placed on the temporary roll of the convention when the national committee endorsed the contents in the First and Fifth districts of South Carolina by seating the Taft men.

Former Governor Benjamin B. Odell of New York was brought forward today as a new candidate for the vice-presidential nomination.

Attorney General Wade Ellis of Ohio is here today with the platform prepared at the request of Secretary Taft to be presented to the committee.

The committee filed objection to the incorporation in the platform of the plank against the free use of injunctions by courts in labor disputes.

The exact wording of the tariff plank is as follows: "A revision of the tariff by special session of the next congress insuring the maintenance of true principle of protection by imposing such duties as will equal the difference between the cost of production at home and abroad, together with a reasonable profit to the end that without excessive duties, American manufacturers, farmers, producers and wage earners may have adequate protection."

Whether to storm the republican national convention or present demands peacefully is the question that suffragists are wrestling with today.

The program for the next three days has been completed. Most of this time will be spent in ascertaining the status of the cause in Utah, Colorado, Wyoming and other western states where women are permitted to vote.
