ORGANIZATION OF NATIONAL CURRENCY ASSOCIATION

WASHINGTON, June 12 .- Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou issued a cir-cular setting forth the conditions under which national currency associations may be organized. In part it says: "National banks occupying contigu-

ous territory may organize national cur renev associations. There must be at lease two banks in each association and the aggregate capital and surplus of the banks must be at least \$5,000,000.
"No banks may join an association

without unimpaired capital and a sur-plus of not less than 25 per cent." The circular then explains at length the provisions of the currency concludes:

"The foregoing applies only to the forming of national currency associa-tions. The method of securing addional circulation will be the subject o later eircualr.
