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### BROWBEATING A JUDGE.

If the Medford Mail is not in contempt of court for an editorial printed Sunday instructing Circuit Judge Hanna what to do in the injunction proceedings brought to keep Medford wet, it is perilously near it. At the very least, it is an audacious attempt to coerce the court into deciding the case as the Mail wishes.

It should be remembered that this case has been argued and submitted to the court, who has announced that he will render his decision Saturday. What is the meaning of the following if not an attempt to browbeat the court?

"The will of the people should at all times be law. This, we are happy to say, is the principle upon which our government is based. There can be no doubt that if this principle is ever lost, that this great land of ours must necessarily perish. With this principle in mind, we cannot help but think that Jackson county should be declared closed to the liquor traffic. The recent election showed emphatically what the will of the people in Jackson county is in regard to the liquor traffic. By a large majority the county was voted 'dry.' Therefore we would see the will of the people respected and the saloons in the county closed.

"Judge Hanna has had submitted to him the legal aspects of a serious question—a question as to whether this city must needs close her gates to the liquor traffic or not, regardless of the people at large. It is needless to state that Judge Hanna will make his decision as he interprets the law, but if he is forced to render a decision allowing the saloons in this city to remain open, after the county has voted 'dry,' then the faster the law which disregards the will of the people at large is repealed the better.

"Judge Hanna will decide upon the reading of the law. But if his decision will allow the liquor traffic to continue operations in this city, then the law is manifestly unjust and should be repealed."

Of course the Mail's arguments are specious and fallacious. The right of a county to dictate to a city under existing laws, the interpretation of a legal problem, the unraveling of conflicting statutes, is the sole question before the court.

The Mail's attitude toward Judge Hanna is on a par with the stacking of council chambers and court rooms to force by intimidation action along certain lines favored by the crowd, and win by browbeating, a practice sympathizers of the Mail's policy have adopted of late.

### WHEN IS A MAJORITY?

One of the preachers leading the prohibition crusade in Medford was asked pointblank the question: "Do you believe in the rule of the majority?"

The minister thought a minute and then said: "Yes, under certain conditions."

He meant that when the majority voted as he thought it should he believed in majority rule. When it voted against his wishes, he did not believe in it.

This was an honest expression from an honest man. Most people really think the same way, but haven't the courage to say so. All prohibitionists think this today.

Much of the prattling heard about majority rule in the wet and dry fight is buncombe, pure and simple. The Anti-Saloon league does practically politics, and resorts to all the tricks ever used by the ward-heeler, besides working several new stunts and keeping the woman and babies busy overtime.

If a precinct is wet, several others known to be dry are tacked on, and the wet closed by "majority rule," that is, by the votes of those living outside the wet precinct. Under the Oregon local option law, the majority rule is always consistently applied to advance the cause of prohibition.

This is the "majority rule" loudly proclaimed by the prohibitionist.

### SAVE THE TROUT AND GAME FISH.

Jackson county citizens are putting up to themselves the question, "Why is a fish warden?" Also, what's the use of stocking up streams with trout for the benefit of anglers while irrigation ditches are taking them off by thousands? The law provides that the intakes of all irrigation ditches shall be screened, but it appears that the water users have made no attempt to comply with the law, and there are neither deputy wardens nor funds with which to pay for such wardens if employed. There is but one appointed fish warden for Southern Oregon—J. D. Wilson of Yoncalla—and he has more territory to look after than three hustling men could properly care for. This condition of things is the best possible argument in favor of a state license for anglers by which to provide funds with which to pay the salaries of deputy wardens and bring to prosecution all violators of the fish laws.—Pacific Outlook.
