PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, There was submitted to the voters of the city of Medford, Oregon, at a special election held for that purpose on May 5, 1908, a proposed amendment to section 100 of the city charter of the said city of Medford, and

Whereas, On the said 9th day of May, 1908, the city recorder, in my presence and in the presence of the city council of said city, did canvass the votes given for and against the said amendment, and

Whereas, It was ascertained and determined upon said canvass that there were 124 votes cast for and 15 votes cast against the said amendment, and that said amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of the law.

Now, therefore, I, B. J. Trowbridge, acting mayor of the city of Medford, Oregon, in the absence of the mayor from the city, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the city of Medford, and I announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the city of Medford at said election, for and against the said amendment, was as hereinbefore stated, and that the said amendment received the affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of the law, and that the said amendment shall be and is in full force and effect from the date of this proclamation, and that the following is the full text of the said amendment:

AMENDMENT.

Of section 100 of the city charter of the city of Medford.

The people of the city of Medford do enact as follows:

That section 100 of an act of the legislature of the state of Oregon, entitled "An act to repeal an act entitled 'An act to repeal an act entitled 'An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, and limiting its powers, and defining the duties of its officers,' and to repeal an act entitled 'An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon,' approved February 24, 1885," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 21, 1889, and all amendments thereof, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, and to define its powers and duties," approved February 1, 1901, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, and to define its powers and duties, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 7, 1905, as amended by the act amendatory thereof, filed in the office of the secretary of state, February 13, 1905, and is further amended by the vote of the people of Medford on the 4th day of June, 1907, and on the 17th day of March, 1908, and the 3d day of April, 1908, he and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 100. No contract shall be entered into by the city, or any franchise granted by it for a longer period than ten years, and no franchise shall grant any exclusive right or rights; provided, that this section shall not be construed to prevent the issuance of the bonds of the city, elsewhere in this charter authorized, for a longer period than ten years, if, in the opinion of the council such a longer term will be for the best interests of the city, but no bonds of the city shall be issued for a longer period than 30 years.

This done at Medford, Oregon, May 11, 1908.

SILVERTON ABANDONS FIGHT ON PROHIBITION SALEM, Or., June 15.—County Judge Scott Saturday issued the formal order proclaiming the result of the recent election in Marion county. The following towns will be dry during the ensuing two years: Amuseville, Detroit, Silvertown, Jefferson, Mahama, Stayton, Marions, Scitiss Mills and Turner. Several precincts in which there are no towns were also proclaimed "dry." An attempt was made to contest the election as to Silvertown, but the move has been abandoned.

BRYAN HAS MORE THAN REQUISITE TWO THIRDS

LINCOLN, Neb., June 15.—William J. Bryan, accompanied by ex-Governor J. E. Osborne of Wyoming, arrived here Saturday. After a short visit Mr. Osborne left for Chicago. At Mr. Bryan's office today it was announced that 297 delegates to the democratic national convention at Denver were pledged to vote for Bryan for president.
