Attorneys Robert G. Smith and E. E. Kelly yesterday filed an amended complaint in the injunction proceedings brought in the case of J. C. Hall vs. G. W. Dunn to keep Medford wet, quot ing from Medford charter.

William M. Colvig, special attorne for the prohibitionists, in the injunction proceedings brought to keep Medford wet, argues in his brief for a dry town as follows:

"This is a soit for on injunction to restrain the county court of Jackson county, Oregon, from making the or dere required of it by section 10 of the local option law. The plaintiff? counsel bases his claim for relief on the decision rendered in Marsden ve Hartocker, 48 Oregon 90.

Case Not On "All Pours."

"That case and the one at bar ar not on "'all fours" as to the facts. It the Marsden case an injunction was sought to restrain the county court of Coos county from making such order, and a general demurrer to the complaint was sustained by the circuit court, whereupon Marsden refused to plead further, and a judgment for costs was entered against him. He appealed to the supreme court, where the action of the lower court was reversed.

Prohibition Election

"Will this court say that on account of the Medford city charter, no election on the question of prohibition can be called for the entire district of the county, that Medford must be excepted on account of its 'inter law? If plaintiff's contention is correct, we as well come out flat-footed and say that the people of Jackson county as a whole cannot have the benefits of the local option law. If the late elec-tion was called for the whole county a a district, and upon a proper petition why should the county court not make the order? If the order does not embrace Medford, will it be binding of Gold Hill and other precincts. I denot think it would be under the previsions of section 10 of the law.

The temperatures of the Ana river vaters—20 degrees or more above the uean annual temperature of the region the United States. indicate that the springs rise from ac surface is probably a mere veneer, whose thickness is much less than is the alluvium that forms the valley floor, it is probable that the waters rise from the underlying rocks along one or more of the lines of easy passage afforded by the faults or fracture planes that imit the valley. But even if the springs vield rock waters from depths, the source of these waters still remains or

The geologists of the United State cological survey, who have been stud-ing the region, rejected at once the den that the areas east and south of he springs could furnish the waters partially because of the aridity in these eas and partly b-cause their investi ations had revealed structural conditions that would tend to prevent the irrelation of the water westward to be point at which it issues. North and est of the springs, however, is a moun aluens region, not well known geo-logically, but including an area that is well timbered and has relatively high rainfall. In this region rise Spragu and Williamson rivers, both streams o considerable volume. It is probable that the surface of this mountain region precuts areas of porous rock capable of ab sorbing the rain water that falls upon it, and these areas are regarded as the nost probable source of the water that issue in such great volumes at the
