

BALL TEAM TO TOUR ORIENT

Picked Players from All Parts of Country to Play the American Game in Cities of the Far East

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 26.—Local ball fans are discussing today the plan which has been arranged for taking a picked team of the best baseball players in this country on a trip through the orient to play the teams in those countries. It has been so far decided upon that J. L. Woods, former business manager for the Reach All Americans, will leave for Yokohama on the Mongolia on Tuesday next.

The trip, according to present plans, will take three months, with games being played at the following cities: Yokohama, Tokio, Kobe, Hongkong, Shanghai, Manila and Honolulu. The American players will meet the university teams and American clubs in all of the places visited.

As at present arranged, the personnel of the team is as follows: Catchers, Pat Donahue, Boston; Jack Bliss, St. Louis Nationals, and Claude Berry, San Francisco Coast league.

Pitchers: Ove Overall, Chicago; Bill Barns, Washington, and Hiefield, Pittsburgh Nationals.

First base: Frank Chance, Chicago; Hal Chase, Chicago Americans, and Joe Nealon, Sacramento State league.

Second base: Delehanty, Washington.

Third base: Bill Devereaux, Santa Cruz league.

Shortstop: Rollie Zeider, San Francisco Coast league.

Outfielders: Tyrus Cobb, Detroit Americans, and George Killebrand, San Francisco Coast league.

ALL EUROPE LAUGHS AT HELIE AND ANNA

LONDON, June 26.—The archbishop of Canterbury today declined to be affected by the piteous appeal of Prince Helie de Sagan and poor Anna and Helie are not married yet.

Helie was furious when he found last week that they could not be married in England until they had been here two weeks unless the archbishop would grant a special license.

That was hard news after they had traveled over most of Europe and much of America in a vain effort to have performed the simple ceremony, which most people can accomplish in a few hours.

Helie was undaunted. Today he went to see the archbishop, but that dignitary saw only the fact that Anna's first husband, the light-hearted Boni, still lives. If he had any sympathy for the love-lorn middle-aged French dandy, he did not show it.

Then Helie took an automobile and dashed to the French embassy, where he vainly sought assistance.

The affair has become the laughing stock of all Europe. The trip across the channel as "Mr. and Mrs. Thompson" and the hundreds of other ramifications in the frantic round-the-world dash for the altar, have convulsed London.

Miss Anna Gould, millionaire daughter of the famous American financier, and the French nobleman will have to wait until they have complied with the laws of the "pig-headed English."

AFRAID TO TRUST BANKS DEPOSITS FORTUNE IN P. O.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—J. Reilly of Oregon City, Or., has unconsciously furnished Postmaster-General Meyer a splendid argument for postal service banks by putting \$25,000 of his savings in government money orders, because he was not willing to trust the banks. He paid Uncle Sam \$75 for taking care of it. The fact that Reilly had adopted this means of saving his money was not generally known until he presented for redemption a big bunch of money orders. There were 250 orders for \$100 each. As they were more than one year old, they could not be cashed, so the postoffice department will replace them with a treasury warrant covering the \$25,000.

Postmaster-General Meyer says postal savings banks could not only have paid interest on the \$25,000 but would have saved Reilly the \$75 he paid for the orders.

NEW AMBASSADOR TO GERMANY WARMLY RECEIVED

BERLIN June 26.—The cordial feeling toward America's ambassador, Hill, is daily growing stronger, owing to the warm appreciation of him expressed by the professional men of Berlin. Professor Philip Zornos of Oxford university, who is an expert on diplomatic history, has published a very complimentary review of Dr. Hill's work as a historian.

Dr. Hill's reception in official circles has been equally warm. On Saturday he will be given a reception by Prince Benlow at the Imperial chancellors' palace.

MANY JACKIES TO SEE GANS-NELSON

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 26.—The fight between Gans and Battling Nelson on July 4 will be popular with sailors of the big fleet. Today many sailors from the fleet purchased tickets, \$1500 in all being taken in from the men wearing the uniform of the navy. Odds are still 10 to 6, with Gans on the long end.

HACKENSCHMIDT, FAMOUS WRESTLER, REPORTED DEAD

LONDON, June 26.—It is rumored that Hackenschmidt, the famous wrestler, is dead at Aix le Chappelle, where he went several weeks ago to take a rest in an effort to recover from injuries received in his match with Frank Gotch at Chicago this spring. The report has not been confirmed.

Hackenschmidt was suffering from water on the knee and some time ago his doctors announced that he would never be able to wrestle again.

MYSTERIOUS SUICIDE OF YOUNG WIFE AT RENO

RENO, Nev., June 25.—Complete mystery surrounds the suicide here of pretty Mrs. Bert Dunham, 19 years old, who drank carbolic acid after writing the following note to her husband: "Dear Bert, I am not guilty. God knows it. Good-bye Emma."

The distracted husband is at a loss to know what the note means, but it is thought that a woman acquaintance had accused the young wife with misconduct and, thinking that her husband would hear and perhaps believe the story, she took her life. Mrs. Dunham's father conducts the Elma hotel in Oklahom City.

TEDDY, JR., IN EMPLOY OF STEEL TRUST AS COMMON LABORER

OYSTER BAY, June 25.—According to a statement given out by Secretary Loeb, Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., has been given a position as a laborer by John Greenway and will be shown no preference over other workmen.

The statement says that neither the president nor his son knew until they saw it in the newspapers that Greenway's company was owned by the steel trust and that young Roosevelt was employed because Greenway was in Colonel Roosevelt's regiment and wanted to give the president's son a chance.

"Young Roosevelt," says Loeb, "will be hired as a common laborer and stand or fall strictly on his own merits."

FAT MEN FORM CLUB TO WORK FOR TAFT

NEW YORK, June 25.—A movement has been started here to form a Fat Man's Taft club, regardless of party lines. The members must weigh at least 300 pounds. The fat men are happy at the weight of Taft, who tips the scales at 360, and many democrats have declared their intention of voting for the heavy candidate on the question of sympathy. Even "Big Tim" Sullivan, the Tammany leader, says that all the fat men of the country will vote for Taft.
