

WATER BONDS FINALLY SOLD

Council Accepts Offer of Nuveen & Co. of Chicago --The Nash License Issued

Three of the city council, Messrs. Merriek, Trowbridge and Wortman, voted against renewing the liquor license to the Hotel Nash, despite the fact that the hotel's petition had been signed by five-sixths of the business men of the city. The mayor cast the deciding vote and the license was issued. Olwell's vote was challenged by Wortman on the ground that he was a resident of another ward from that which he represented, but the challenger was unable to state what ward Mr. Olwell was a resident of. Mr. Wortman admitted that this was the first time he had had occasion to challenge Mr. Olwell's vote and he threatened injunction proceedings to close the hotel bar.

Water Bonds Sold.

Nuveen & Co.'s bid for city bonds was accepted, all councilmen voting aye except Hafer. The firm's commission is \$18,250 or 5 per cent for the issue of \$365,000 5 per cent thirty year water bonds. Nuveen & Co.'s check for \$18,250, on Nuveen & Co., bankers, certified to by Nuveen & Co., was accepted as earnest of good faith by the council. Petition for water and sewer pipe beyond the Catholic school referred to the city engineer.

Reports of the city engineer, chief of police, recorder and treasurer were read and accepted.

Moved by Eifer and seconded by Merriek that the city attorney be directed to draw up articles of arbitration with the Condon Water & Power Company.

Economy Is Exercised.

Report of the finance committee was read, and accepted. Wortman moved to disallow the bill of T. E. Pottenger as recorder's assistant for 11 days at \$2 a day, and Trowbridge moved to disallow the bill of Weeks & McEwan for linoleum on the city hall floor, but both bills were allowed. The bill of Conrad for a check protector was disallowed. Recorder Collins was instructed to notify Jacobsen-Bade Co. to buy a 6 inch main on West Tenth street.

CONTESTS DECIDED

Kings county, created a sensation in his opening sentence.

"If this man McArren tells you he will support Bryan when he goes home from this convention he lies," shouted Williams. "Don't forget this. He lies, and he does not dare to say that he will either vote or work for the party leader. Through the columns of his chosen organ in Brooklyn he announced that he will not tolerate Bryan or Bryanism. This Julius betrayed the democratic ticket at the last election in New York state and defeated the candidate for governor, Mr. Hearst."

In the Ohio district contests the evidence presented was an exact duplicate of that brought out before the national committee at its meeting on Monday. There was no appearance of the delegates of the nineteenth district seated by the national committee on the personal appeal of Mrs. Tom L. Johnson. The committee voted to seat the contestants who were present, but later rescinded that action and has announced it would pass upon the merits of the case when the other contests were voted upon.

Pennsylvania Contest. When Pennsylvania was reached Chas. Donnelly and William J. Brennan presented the case of the Guffey men, while J. Berwood Daly and Lev. McWhiston argued against continuing on the roll the delegates who are friendly to the Pittsburgh boss.

Both Donnelly and Brennan argued that Guffey was the logical leader of the party in Pennsylvania and they denied that he had ever made deals with the republican bosses, whereby they aided in defeating the Bryan men in the city of Philadelphia. He stated that Guffey had worked unceasingly for the success of the democratic party, and declared that but for his efforts and his liberal use of funds for party use, there would be no democratic party in the Keystone state.

Daly and McWhiston accused the Pennsylvania boss of selling out the party in Philadelphia to the opposition. He declared that he personally begged every member of the last state convention to vote in favor of an unstructured delegation to this convention.

Several Verbal Encounters. There were several heated verbal encounters during the presentation of the Pennsylvania case, which was reached long after daylight, and it required radical measures by the chairman to keep peace.

The last case to be taken up was the contest from the District of Columbia, and here also the evidence was exactly the same as presented to the committee Monday. The credentials committee went into executive session and also began the discussion of the merits of each contest.

Along the west side of block 52.

Along the east side of lots 1 and 2, in block 45; all in the city of Medford, according to the duly recorded plat thereof.

Also, along the west side of the south 124 feet of block 1, in Galloway's addition to the city of Medford.

Along the north side of the west 615 feet of block 6, in Galloway's addition to the city of Medford.

Along the east side of the south 178 feet of block 5, in Galloway's addition to the city of Medford.

Along the south side of Ninth street from the northeast corner of the Broack reserve to a point 81.2 feet west of said northeast corner.

And the recorder is hereby directed and required to notify the owners and occupants of said premises to rebuild such sidewalks at their own expense within thirty (30) days after the date of such notice, under the direction and supervision of the city engineer, and in accordance with the ordinances regulating such matters.
