

# VOTE SHOWS BRYAN'S LEAD

## Guffey Case Brings Out Nebraskans Strength— Sure on First Ballot.

DENVER, Col., July 9.—An effort is being made by the anti-Bryans to show by the voting in the democratic convention on the Guffey case that Bryan has not got the necessary two-thirds vote to nominate him. This claim is based on the fact that only 625 could be mustered to carry out the Bryan plan of ousting the Guffey delegates. If the 237 delegates who voted to sustain were to stand firm, it is argued, they could prevent the nomination of Bryan on the first ballot.

In this speculation he says, they overlooked the Maine delegation, who came to vote for Bryan, but who did not intend to support all of his policies throughout. Among the votes cast in favor of the Pennsylvania delegates were the following from delegations instructed for Bryan:

California 6, Colorado 9, Illinois 5, Ohio 5, Missouri 5, South Carolina 9, Tennessee 8, West Virginia 5, District of Columbia 6, Virginia 4.

A total of 123 votes. Adding to that the 651 votes cast in the convention against Guffey, makes a grand total of 774 at the very least which will go to Bryan on the first ballot for president. As the number necessary to nominate is only 671, it will be seen that Bryan has 67 more than two-thirds of the convention for him on the basis of last night's vote alone, which will land him at the head of the ticket in triumph.

### JACKSONVILLE PLANNING COUNTY FRUIT FAIR

Jacksonville people are evidently ignorant of the fact that Medford is to hold the Rogue River Valley Horticultural fair here in September, for a movement is on foot to hold a county fair at the county seat.

A letter from Jacksonville states: "How do you people stand on a county fruit fair to be held at Jacksonville some time in September? We are on the verge of pulling one off. We want to raise about \$10,000 here in Jacksonville and then will ask Medford for a small donation, say \$500, and the other towns in the county will be asked to put up a small amount each. We want to give away about \$7500 in cash prizes for fruit and mineral displays, the principal amount to be given for fruit."

Medford's fair directors ought to get busy and let the people of the county know something of the fair here.
