Along the east side of lots 1 and 2, in block 45; all in the city of Medford, according to the duly recorded plat thereof.

Also, along the west side of the south 134 feet of block 1, in Galloway's addition to the city of Medford.
Along the north side of the west 615 feet of block 6, in Galloway's addition to the city of Medford.
Along the east side of the south 175 feet of block 5, in Galloway's addition to the city of Medford.
