We will not be misunderstood when we say that ever since he has increased his eligibility and decreased his popularity. A seeming, but not an actual, paradox is this. His eligibility has increased, because no man of his skill and readiness in his party has appeared to dispute the lists with him.

Moreover, Mr. Bryan has dropped some of the heresies his two defeats stamped out and others his travels refuted. He has dropped free silver—if only for a while. He has substituted eventual for immediate equipment of the Philippines with self-government.

While the Morning Astor will not and cannot support Mr. Bryan, we would not underrate his strength. There are millions of unsteady and star-struck voters who may swing into the Bryan ranks.

Because Mr. Bryan is unsafe we oppose him. Because he can believe or change belief at will, we oppose him. Because he is convinced that whatever may win should be advocated and what ever may lose should be renounced, we oppose him.

'TIS EAST VS. THE WEST.

Bryan and Kern, both western men, heading a radical ticket upon a radical platform, is presented the country by the national democratic convention at Denver.

The country now has its choice between conservatism and radicalism. Had Roosevelt been nominated there would have been two radical tickets in the field, but Mr. Taft is by nature and training a conservative.

On the other hand, labor is directly appealed to by the democrats, and the present hard times in the east and lack of employment under a republican administration make a hopeful possibility for the opposition.

The west is to be the battle ground, with the radicalism of the west fighting the conservatism of the east.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Every record was smashed by the giant Cunard liner Lusitania, when she arrived in quarantine at 5:32 o'clock this morning. The Cunarder left Liverpool July 4. She crossed the Atlantic in four days 19 hours and 36 minutes, which is 31 minutes faster than her previous record.
