BATTLESHIPS ENJOY FAIR WEATHER VOYAGE

ON BOARD THE BATTLESHIP GEORGIA, At Sea, July 11.—(By wire less.)—The battleship fleet is progressing satisfactorily on its voyage to Hawaii, having encountered perfect weather so far. At 12 o'clock today the ships will be 1050 miles west of San Francisco, proceeding at the fixed rate of ten knots per hour. Each day the white vessels go through maneuvers and it is a beautiful sight as the ships move gracefully through formations in an answer to the fluttering signals from the Connecticut. No untoward incident of any kind has occurred.
