The recall hav provides that "there may be required 25 per cent, but not more" of the voters of the district who voted at the preceding election to ourt justice to sign the recall As the state election did not recognize the ward boundaries as procinets, it is impossible to segregate the votes and determine who in North Med ford precinct voted from the First ward, and the probability is therefore that the recall will be ineffective in this instance The recall law reads as follo

GALLAGHER DYNAMITER

Man Who Blew Up Former Supervisor's Home Confesses Guilt---Police are Searching Confederate

SAN PRANCISCO, Cal., July 14.-The detective force of this city is to day searching every possible corner of the city for Peter Claudianes, a Greek, aged 21 years, who has been implicated in the dynamiting of the houses of James Gallagher, the chief witness in the graft prosecution by a remarkable confession made by his brother, John Claudianes, who says that he himself actually exploded the charges of dyna-Notices have been sent to the chiefs of police in every city in the country, and men have been sent from here to Chico, Cal., where it is thought that some trace of Claudianes can be found. John Claudianes, the confessed dynamiter, is in jail here and is being closely confined.

Didn't Get Blood Money

John Claudianes made his confess to District Attorney Langdon between midnight and 5 o'clock last Sunday morning and the information had been carefully guarded in the hope that the police may locate Peter Claudianes, whom, says his brother, made a deal with other persons to kill Gallagher for money.
