

HOW LABOR VIEWS PLANK

Demands of Union Leaders Upon Democrats and What They Secured

The following is a confidential bulletin of labor news from the Denver convention issued by Marshall Cushing, secretary of the national joint committee and shows how labor regards the democratic platform:

President and executive committee American Federation of Labor presented to resolutions committee certain demands (which appear to have been modified considerably for platform) chiefly as follows:

1. Demanded guarantee to wage earners, agriculturists and horticulturists "that such associations or their members shall not be regarded as illegal combinations;" got it for labor organizations and their members.

Injunction Prohibition.

2. Demanded prohibition of injunctions in labor disputes "when such injunctions would not apply when no labor disputes existed;" and that no injunction shall be issued "when there exists a remedy by the ordinary process of law;" got reiteration of pledges in platform of 1896 and 1897 approving Hill bill (passed senate 1896) requiring jury trials in cases of indirect contempt; nothing therein, therefore, with regard to injunctions; also got promise that injunctions shall not be issued "in any cases in which injunctions would not issue if no industrial disputes were involved."

Demand probably based on theory that strikes do not interfere with property rights, and thus would not be enjoined; conservatives on resolutions committee deny this and regard anti-injunction promise as vague and useless to Federation of Labor.

3. Demanded extension of eight hour law to all government employees and to employees of government contractors or sub-contractors; got promise of eight-hour day "on all government work."

4. Demanded promises of general employers' liability set and department of labor, and got them.

Conflicting Opinions.

Leading lawyer on resolutions declares it to be opinion of conservatives on committee that if business or good will be held to be property, then labor gets nothing by anti-injunction plank, and that if promise that labor organizations shall not be regarded as illegal combinations means amendment to Sherman law, then it gets much; conservatives deny that promise means that, if it means legalizing the interstate boycott conspiracy.

Labor leaders undoubtedly consulted step by step, as labor plank in platform assumed shape; appear greatly pleased; conservatives believe planks mean simply reiteration of previous promises. If the latter supposition be true, then provisions of notice and hearing in injunction cases, whether relating to labor disputes or not, and exemption of labor organizations from operation of Sherman law were evidently not accomplished.

Buy Tickets by Wire.

"Something which is of considerable interest to the public generally and which is perhaps not generally known is the system of prepaid orders now in effect between stations of the Southern Pacific company and all points in the United States. By means of this system tickets may be purchased at Medford from any place in the United States and mailed or telegraphed direct to the party wishing to come here. Sleeper accommodations and small amounts of cash in connection with these tickets may also be furnished at the same time."

GOVERNMENT BOYCOTTS

PACIFIC COAST DEALERS

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Unless word is received from Colonel Goethel today to the contrary, Pacific coast dealers will not be considered in the purchasing of supplies by the commissary department of the usual commission. Captain Giegge, purchasing agent for the Panama canal commission, in a statement given out today said that poor steamship service on the Pacific coast is responsible for the decision.

The Pacific merchants have requested that some of the supplies be purchased there and shipped to La Brea. Captain Giegge says that if supplies were purchased on the Pacific coast and there should be a failure to ship on any vessel it would be 20 days before another shipment could arrive. On the Atlantic coast shipments can be made every four days. Twenty days is to long an interval for the shipment of fresh food, says Captain Giegge, but prunes and dried peaches might be purchased on the Pacific coast.

OREGON DELEGATION IS GRATIFIED WITH TICKET

Gratified with the nomination of Bryan and Kern and professing confidence of their election in November, five members of Oregon's delegation to the democratic national convention have returned from Denver to Portland.
