

JAPS AROUSE GREAT BRITAIN

Feeling of Unfriendliness Growing Between England and Japan

LONDON, July 17.—Evidence of growing unfriendliness between England and Japan appeared today in the announcement that the house of commons shortly will take formal notice of the charges that Japan is gradually crowding British commerce from Korea and Manchuria.

The suggestion that the United States and England form an agreement in regard to the action to be taken in oriental affairs has been frequently made. The action of the Japanese in endeavoring to monopolize the entire commercial interests as charged in the complaints made here repeatedly is unpleasant to big British interests engaged in oriental trade.

This is the first time that the government has taken notice of the situation, though much has been published concerning it in the British newspapers. In Japan the situation is looked upon as being of tremendous importance.

Japan has the bitter ill-will of China, Russia has not forgotten the war. It is intimated that England's action might lead to a weakening of the British-Japanese alliance on the ground that Japan's methods in Manchuria and Korea are unfriendly to England.

The two divas sing exactly the same repertoire and Melba declares she will not allow any other soprano to appear in any of her operas. She wants Lucia, Gilda and Violetta exclusively for herself.

Melba explains that she will go to Australia, as she has a concert contract to fulfill and her "dear old daddy" wants her there.

SAN JOSE, Cal., July 17.—The sheriff's officers are trying today to ascertain whether Bradford Van Vrankin, a rancher, is the victim of murderous thieves or he tried to commit suicide by slashing his naked body time and time again with a knife.

The man was found lying in a pool of blood on the floor of his home with his little baby girl, unharmed, lying in the blood beside him. He was naked and there was a bloody trail all over the house.

No knife with which the wound might have been made was found about the place. The man told an incoherent story when he was revived at the hospital.

Copa de Oro, a California horse which campaigned in Oregon and Washington last year, captured the 2:07 pace in 2:06:1-4 and 2:06:1-4. Durfee also pulled down second with Zonita in a 2:30 trot.

Battling Nelson, lightweight champion of the world, and Joe Gans, the dusky ex-champion, who lost his title to Nelson at San Francisco July 4, are to meet in the ring for the third time at Ely, Nev., Labor day, September 7. This was decided on with Tex Rickard, the Nevada fight promoter. The purse for which the boxers will fight is \$30,000. Nelson is to receive \$20,000, win, lose or draw, and Gans is to receive \$10,000.
