Bryan Congratulated in a Speech Made to Delegation---No Intimatian of a Visit From Johnson Yet

(By John E. Nevins.) LINCOLN, Neb., July 18.—William J. Bryan is receiving telegrams and congratulations today on a speech he made to a delegation of labor leaders last night, but he refused to make the messages public and would not discuss

Bryan would say nothing today about the report that labor leaders would take the stump and advocate his election in the coming campaign. The candidate said that he had not received any inti-mation that Governor Johnson of Minnesota is coming here to see him, but added that Johnson would be exceedingly welcome to Pairview. It has been reported that Johnson is coming here

It is probable that Bryan will spend two days in Chicago when he goes there July 25 to attend the meeting of the subcommittee of the national dem-ocratic convention, at which a chair-

man will be selected.

He expects to make several informal speeches along the route, and this trip will mark the beginning of the cam-paign. He said all the speeches will be confined to the discussion of the plat-form and the results of its adoption.

Bryan refused to go on a special. He will travel in the usual manner and will be accompanied by only his secretary and newspaper reporters.

NIGHTWATCHMAN FOUND WITH HEAD GRUSHED TO PULP

Evidences of Fearful Struggle in Ala mada Borax Plant-Gas Pipe the Deadly Instrument Weilded-Chased Among Vats by Assailants.

OAKLAND, Cal., July 18,-His head rushed to a pulp, the body of Henry Baugs, for 20 years watchman of the Pacific Coast Borax company's plant in Alameda, was found in the yard of the

Evidences of a fearful struggle were found all through the basement of the plant and out to where the body was found, 20 feet from the main building.

Two pieces of inch and a half gas-pipe, each two feet long, and one cov-ered with bair and clotted blood, show the manner in which Bangs was killed and indicate that two men were impliand indicate that two men were impli-cated in the crime, though one dealt all the blows. A cut on one of Bangs hands shows a knife played a part in the fight, and the absence of the wenyon indicates that the murderers wielded

attacked in the basement of the plant, which is filled with large vats. Among these wats the fearful battle waged, Bangs evidently trying to escape his pursuers. The course of the weakening prints on the sides of the sacks as he tendied himself ugainst them in his flight. But in the yard are four p of blood, showing that Bangs was felled onany times by the thugs, only to arise and attempt to continue his flight. The condition of the body when found

indicated that the thigs must have pounded the head for some minutes aftor the man had fallen for the last time.

His pockets were found turned wrong side out, and tobbery was the motive for the crime, Bangs did not drink or squander his money, and it is supposed that the moreless of the same to the hat the murderers thought he kept a large sum of money on his person or in the plant. Nothing found by the authorities indicates they were right in

England Increases Lead by Winning More Events, Including Cycling and Swimming-Germans Successful in Hifh Dives-Other Events.

LONDON, July 18.—Sheridan of America won the first place in the finals in the discus throw, Greek style, his mark being 124 feet 8 inches. Horr of America, who won second place, hurled the weight 122 feet 5.12 inches, and Jarvinen of Finland took third place at 119 feet 8.14 inches.
