HUNTING LAWS ABBREVIATED

Deer—Open on bucks from July 15 to October 31. Not more than three shall be killed by one man in season. Does may be killed only between September 1 and October 31.

Elk—May be killed from September 15 to October 15, but it is intended to close on this species perpetually. Only one may be killed during season.

Violations of the game laws are punished by a severe penalty and it is planned to make the statutes more rigid.

NO PANIC IF TAFT FAILS TO WIN OUT

"HOT SPRINGS, Va., July 21.—Melville E. Ingalls, chairman of the board of directors of the Big Four railroad, democratic candidate for mayor of Cincinnati, in 1908, and considered one of the shrewdest financiers in the country, put a quietus on some of the stories of the danger of panic following the presidential election in an interview today.

"If Bryan is elected," he said, "there will be an off time in Wall street for about a month, but after that it will quiet down."

"The election of Taft probably would not cause any flurry at all in financial circles.

"In either event, the results will be about the same after the election is over."

"Ingalls believes the country's safe and that there is no danger of a repetition of last winter's stringency."
