

63 IN DANGER ON STRANDED LINER ANUBIAS

No Word Received From Vessel Pounding to Pieces Off Santa Barbara

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 22.—No word has been received this forenoon from the scene of the wreck of the German liner Anubias, which at last account was pounding to pieces against the jagged reefs near San Miguel island. Of the fate of the 63 men who were left aboard of the freighter nothing definite is known. Up to the time the first and second mates of the Anubias left the wreck with nine members of the crew in a lifeboat, no lives had been lost, but the big steamer was rapidly breaking up, her after deck being awash and the waves that rolled over her hammering her hull on the rocks.

SWIMMER INJURED AT OLYMPIC GAMES

LONDON, July 22.—Striking the water sideways, Cane, the English swimmer, was seriously injured today while making a high dive at the Olympic games. This is the first serious accident that has marred the games this year.

Cane's foot slipped as he was leaving the platform, and although he tried to right himself in the air, he was not successful, and struck the water with such terrific force that he was rendered unconscious. Spanberg of Sweden realized what had happened and, plunging into the tank, rescued the drowning Englishman. Cane was removed to a hospital, where he is being examined for internal injuries.

Running Jump Record.

T. C. Irons of America made a new Olympic record in the running broad jump today, his mark being 24 feet 3 inches. Prinstein, who held the record, made only 23 feet 7 1/2 inches at the Olympic games at Athens in 1906. Irons made his jump while competing in combined sections five and six in the preliminaries to the final event.

In sections one and two of the running broad jump, R. T. Cook of America won first place, his jump being 22 feet, 10 1/2 inches. In sections three and four Daniel J. Kelly of America won first place by jumping 23 feet 3 1/4 inches, and in sections seven and eight Breiker of Canada won first with a mark of 23 feet 3 inches.

Good Time Is Made.

Kerr of Canada won first place in the first heat in the semifinals of the 200 meter dash, his time being the best of the winners of the first four heats. Kerr took his heat in 22.5 seconds. Heat two was won by Cartmel of America in 22.5 seconds; heat three was won by Cloughen of America in 22.5 seconds, and heat four was won by Hawkins of England in 22.5 seconds.

Dole of America made a good showing in the first rounds of the featherweight catch-as-catch-can wrestling bouts today. In the first round he defeated Cokin and in the second round succeeded in getting the decision over Webster of England.

GARFIELD REVERSES LAND COMMISSIONER

That the land included in the famous "37.40" territory is doomed to starting reverses and surprises to respective litigants is again evidenced by the decision of the secretary of the interior in the case of Mason G. Meservy vs. William P. Byrne, just received by C. P. Stone, attorney for Meservy. The commissioner of the general land office under date of January 28, 1908, reversed the decision of the register of the Klamath Falls land office and the contest decided in favor of the homesteader, Mr. Byrne. An appeal was taken to the secretary of the interior and that official has reversed the decision of the commissioner, ordered the homestead entry canceled and allows Mr. Meservy the privilege of filing on the land.

The contest involves homestead entry 3431 for lot 1, section 2, in township 37 south of range 10 E. W. M., and is one of the most valuable claims included in the "37 19" territory. The commissioner found from the evidence that the claim contained between three and four million feet of merchantable timber, and that while the contestee had not done all that the law required in the way of cultivation, that he had done the best he could under the circumstances and that he was entitled to the homestead. The secretary holds that the residence and cultivation were not sufficient to comply with the law and that the contestee's home on the land was merely nominal.
