### HAPPY CAMP ROAD TO DIVERT TRAVEL ON KLAMATH

HORN BROOK, Cal., Aug. 1.—Work has been commenced on a new piece of road down the Klamath river, and when completed will remove the last steep grade between Hornbrook and Happy Camp. A large force of men is on the job, and it will be completed within 30 days. The road funds of this district were a little short, owing to the extensive road work that has been done this year, so the people of the community chipped in and will add a donation of a few hundred dollars to help along the work. This new road was all that was necessary to bring nearly all the Klamath river travel to Hornbrook, and it will be a big help to the business of this community.
