**CONDUCTS MINING SWINDLE FROM PRISON CELL**

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., August 7.—State Mineralogist E. L. Aubrey applied to the postoffice authorities to deny the use of the mails to Captain W. E. Emmons, now in the county jail awaiting the outcome of an appeal from conviction and sentence to six years in prison for the fraudulent sale of mining stock. Aubrey alleges that Emmons is conducting a fake scheme from his prison cell and trying to sell the very stock that got him into trouble before.

Emmons has a typewriter and stationery in his prison office and conducts his business from there. Everything is as handy as an office and there is no rent to pay.

Emmons directs that his letters be addressed to Thomas Bates, manager of the Boyce Lumber company here, and Aubrey has asked for a fraud order against Bates also. Bates claims to know nothing of Emmons' stock. He is vice-president of the mining company, but not concerned with its doings, he says.

The mine in question is the "Drummer Boy" mine. Emmons was convicted June, 1907, for selling stock in the mine to Mrs. M. E. Hurst. She bought \$5000 worth of stock and Emmons got \$750 worth of securities from her in addition. She alleged that he used a hypnotist's influence to sell his stock.

**ADOPT DRASTIC MEASURES REGARDING PURE FOOD LAW**

MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich., August 7.—Following the charges made by Professor E. E. Ladd, accusing Secretary of Agriculture James Wilson with trying to defeat the ends of pure food departments has adopted drastic measures amounting to a defiance of the national food and discussion centers around the probable results.

A resolution was put through the convention calling for a committee to draft a uniform pure food law, which all the states in the Union will be urged to adopt, and which will contain only such portions of the national law as the state associations deem best adapted to the requirements of the states. A committee is hard at work today drawing up these measures.

The action is practically an announcement that the states intend the matter of food legislation to remain in their own hands, due to their distrust of the nation to adjust properly the situation.

Vice-President Fairbanks attended the convention yesterday and expressed great satisfaction at the way Dr. H. W. Wiley, head of the bureau of chemistry, had aided in the adoption of adequate pure food legislation. The convention decided to meet next year in Denver.

Professor A. O. Froel, who has successfully filled the position of principal of the Gold Hill schools during the past several years, has resigned and removed to Portland to engage in business.

Samuel Kidder of Baker City, Or., one of the most prominent sheepowners and democratic politicians in the state, is looking over the Rogue River valley with a view to investing. Mr. Kidder is quite confident that Bryan will be elected and wishes to repose under his own vine and figtree.

Fruit in the orchards along the foothills in southern Oregon was not damaged by the early frosts. The growers claim that the crop in this district will be heavier this year than was ever known. Fruit on the lowlands was damaged, but the heavy crop on the uplands will offset this shortage.
