### ENTIRE CONTRACT LET FOR ROAD TO KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, August 12.—Klamath Falls is about to experience the actual results from the approach of the railroad. Heretofore all construction work done on the California North-eastern has been remote from this city to bring any direct benefits to the business men of Klamath Falls, but now comes the announcement by the railroad officials that the contract for the construction of the entire road to this city, including Morris tunnel and the big cut north of this city, has been let to Erickson & Peterson and within a few weeks a portion of their large outfit is to be brought to this end of the line to make the big cut and to use the dirt in filling in the yards and in the construction of the roadbed between this city and the marsh. Erickson & Peterson are the contractors who have built most of the road and the awarding of the contract to them of the remainder of the line, with the exception of the marsh work, shows that when E. H. Harriman in his address a few days ago stated that the road would reach this city in the early spring he was not guessing, but knew the exact conditions.

The letting of the contract coming on the heels of the announcement of Mr. Harriman himself that the road will be built to the navigable water this fall and to this city next spring gives the people of this section renewed hope and encouragement and will have a decided bearing upon general conditions. It is positive evidence that work on the road will not stop, but, on the contrary, will be prosecuted more vigorously than heretofore. So far as can be learned it is the intention of the contractors to bring one of their large steam shovels in here at an early date for use on the big cut.

The exact conditions of the contract have not yet been made public, but it is the intention of the Southern Pacific to rush the road to this city and in order to avoid delay on the marsh the third dredge is to be added at once. An order has been placed for the machine and it will be put in operation as soon as it arrives.

### HOBSON'S CHOICE, HE SAYS, IS MRS. KYLE ONLY

WASHINGTON, August 12.—Charging that the New York authorities hurried him away from the Tombs prison before he could keep an engagement at 7:30 a. m. today with Mrs. Raymond Kyle, with whom he eloped from Washington, Edward M. Hobson, said to be the cousin of Richmond Pearson Hobson, and arrested in New York several days ago on charges of embezzlement, reached here today. He was taken before Judge Barnard and there held in bond of \$1000, in default of which he was remanded to jail.

He said that the authorities came to his cell before 7 o'clock, although he was not to leave until 7:30, the time of the engagement with the woman, and hurried him into his clothes. He declared he loathed in dressing, but they succeeded in getting him out at 7:25.

### COUPLE MARRIED ON DECK OF SOUTH DAKOTA

VALLEJO, Cal., August 12.—Pretty little Mrs. Henry P. Bowen today declared that she was willing to stay at home and let her husband sail the seas if she were allowed to visit the cruiser South Dakota when it is in port and were treated as nicely as she was yesterday afternoon, when she became a bride on the cruiser's deck.

### NEARLY KILLS IN COURT MAN ACCUSED BY GIRL

TRENTON, N. J., August 12.—Harvey Baker, one of the best known residents of Trenton, was nearly murdered today by Thomas Mathias at the trial of Baker on a charge of having abused 13-year-old Ada Mathias in the stock room of the East Trenton machine works, of which Baker is superintendent.

At the time of Baker's arrest Mathias tried to get a mob to lynch Baker. When the prisoner was arraigned in the central police court today Mathias got Baker by the throat, and despite the efforts of policemen, he retained what seemed to be a death hold and it looked for a time as if Baker would be killed.

Finally Mathias was taken away exhausted. As the prisoner was led back to his cell the father's last words were that he would take his life at the first opportunity.

### RISBEE POSTOFFICE HAS MOUNTAIN AGAINST IT

RISBEE, Ariz., August 12.—For the second time within a week the Risbee postoffice was put out of commission yesterday by a cloudburst. At the same time in the day as last Tuesday, a heavy rain came up and, when a cloud burst over Mule mountain, tons of rock and dirt slid into the postoffice, piling near by ten feet high. The office was also flooded with mud and silt.

### SAYS OREGON IS FOR INDEPENDENCE LEAGUE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., August 12.—Neal O'Hare of Portland, Ore., member of the Oregon state committee of the independence party and delegate to the Chicago convention, passed through San Francisco yesterday on his return trip to Portland. Mr. O'Hare is a prominent Portland business man, with a host of friends and a strong political following. He is enthusiastic over the nominees and the platform of the independence party and predicts a surprisingly large vote in his state.

The county court has entered into a contract with the Jackson County Abstract company whereby the latter is to furnish the county with a complete set of present ownership maps or plats of every parcel of real estate in the county.

### POPE'S JUBILEE BRINGS VATICAN MILLION DOLLARS

ROME, August 12.—The Vatican treasury is richer by \$1,000,000 this year owing to the generous thank offerings poured into it to celebrate the Pope's jubilee. The bulk of the offerings came from Italians, but there were generous donations from American, French and British Catholics.

### What Papers Say

#### GUARANTEED DEPOSITS.

(The Commoner.) In his speech of acceptance Mr. Taft puts himself squarely on record as being opposed to guaranteed deposits. He says: "The democratic platform recommends a tax upon national banks and upon such state banks as may come in, in the nature of enforced insurance to raise a guaranty fund to pay the depositors of any bank which fails. The proposal is wholly impracticable unless it is to be accompanied by a complete revolution in our banking system, with a supervision so close as practically to create a government bank. If the proposal were adopted exactly as the democratic platform suggests, it would bring the whole banking system of the country down in ruin."

Why seek to confuse the people on a simple proposition? We are supposed to have government supervision of national banks now. Supervision does not mean a government bank; it simply means that the national bank inspectors will do just as they are expected to do under existing law—make their examination of banks thorough and make prompt and effective correction of any irregularities discovered. So it will be difficult to frighten the people by the claim that guaranteed deposits means thorough supervision of banks. That's just exactly what the people want.

It is absurd to say that guaranteed deposits would "bring the whole banking system of the country down in ruin." What does "guaranteed deposits" mean? It means that the savings of the masses shall be secured so that when men and women deposit their hard-earned money in banking institutions, they need not worry for fear it will be lost through the recklessness and dishonesty of bank officials. The federal government demands of these banks security for the money it deposits. As a rule state governments and county governments and municipal governments make similar requirements. But now that it is proposed that depositors generally shall have some such assurance for the safe keeping of their wealth, we are told by the republican candidate for the presidency that the adoption of such a plan "would bring the whole banking system of the country down in ruin."

#### PSEUDO NOBLEMAN SENT UP FOR SIX YEARS

SALINAS, Cal., August 12.—Still smiling and happy, Walter G. Smith, butterfly of fashion pseudo nobleman, earl of Radcliffe, jailbreaker and forger, was taken to San Quentin to serve a six years' sentence for breaking jail. Smith first appeared here in June, 1907. He spent money liberally, had a retinue of servants and was much sought after by mothers with marriageable daughters. He declared that he was the rightful "earl of Radcliffe."

#### CALIFORNIA CANDY IS GROSSLY ADULTERATED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., August 12.—According to a statement by Secretary N. K. Foster of the state board of health made public today, an analysis of several thousand samples of candy at the state laboratory at Berkeley shows that nearly all cheap candy manufactured in California is grossly adulterated, some of the samples showing as high as 25 per cent of paraffine.

#### ASIATIC PLAGUE SWEEPS RUSSIAN VOLGA REGION

ST. PETERSBURG, August 12.—The Asiatic cholera continues to make steady, though, as yet, not alarming progress in the Volga region. The chief centers of the disease are at Astrakhan and in Saratov province, notably the cities of Saratov and Tsibirsk.
