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HOOD RIVER'S APPLE CROP BEING SHIPPED HOGD RIVER, Or., August 14 .--- The first of Hood River's early fall apples are now being shipped out, but as yet no sales of winter fruit have been re-ported. Usually by this time in the season arrangements have been made to secure the part of the crop handled by

individual shippers, but buyers so far this year have made no purchases. Authorities here on the apple situation on the coast state that the same conditions prevail in the other fruitgrowing sections in the Pacific north-west, and it is also stated that buyers are holding off in the hope of securing lower prices. Advices from the east are to the effect that they have combined to bear the apple market in the west, although eastern growers report onall crops. It is thought by many that some kind

of an agreement was entered into by buyers not to purchase any apples until after the meeting of the International Apple Shippers' association at Niagara Falls August 5 to 8. It is believed that later there will be the same scramble for fancy western box fruit that there has been in former years.


