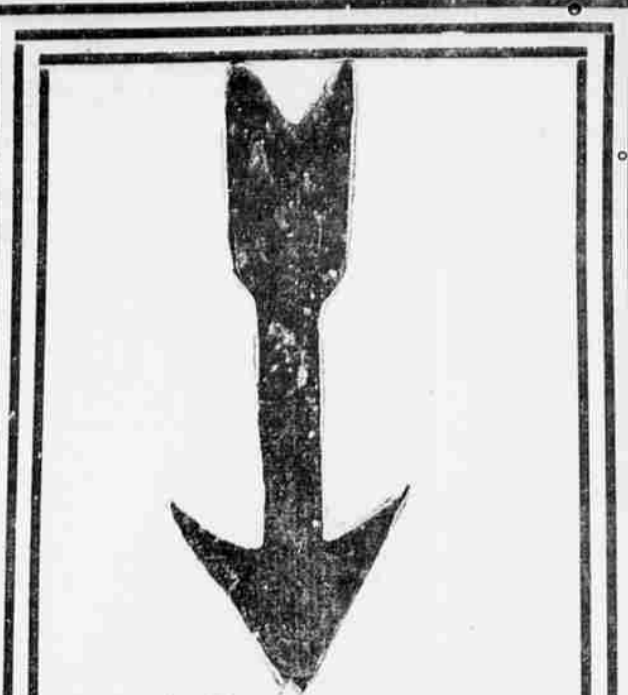
### HODSON AFTER A RECORD TO CRATER LAKE

### KILLED BABE WITH HATPIN AND HANGED HERSELF

CHICAGO, Ill., August 19.—After having killed her baby by establishing it with a hatpin and throwing it into a vacant lot, Mrs. Freddie Goldberg of this city yesterday went into the woods and hanged herself to a tree. Her body was found this morning swinging from a limb not more than three blocks away from the lot where she had thrown her baby's body.

The body was identified by a scrap of paper found in the lot with her name written on it. Investigation showed that she had stopped for a week at the home of George Klein of Kenosha, but nothing is known about there.

The police are investigating the case.

### TROOPS STARTED ON 250-MILE MARCH

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., August 19.—Three troops of the First field artillery, comprising batteries D, E and F, in command of Captain Albert F. Frankner, left the Presidio early today to begin their 250-mile march to Camp Anza, Cal., where they will enter the annual target practice and maneuvers to be held there by United States troops during September and October.

The batteries leaving today form the advance guard of troops detailed for this service and will be responsible for establishing the camp. Twelve days will be consumed in the march, an average distance of about 20 miles per day.
