**WILEY ADMITS THAT OREGON MILK IS GOOD**

WASHINGTON, August 21.—Dr. Harry W. Wiley, government pure food expert, said today in response to inquiry that the department of agriculture would adopt no regulations which would injure Oregon manufacturers of condensed milk.

Notwithstanding recommendations made at the recent conference at Mackinac Island, he said no standard would be set up which would exclude Oregon milk from market. In fact, Dr. Wiley

admitted Oregon condensed milk was of high grade, though it showed less percentage of solids than that produced further east. He said there was absolutely no reason why Oregon manufacturers should be alarmed. There is allowance of 6 per cent to be made in matter of solids, and even if there were not, no regulations would be adopted which would injure Oregon's industry.
