"The republican platform says that experience has shown that the effectveness of the anti-trust law could be strengenehtd by amendments which will give the fedreal government greater su pervision and control of those interstate ommerce corporations which have the power and opportunity to effect monop-olies. That is all. No pointing out of remedies, no outlining of a plan for more effective legislation. Mr. Taft's speech of acceptance is even weaker than the platform. He gives no evidence of having studied the question or of comprehending the iniquities of a monopoly.
